GIFT OF CYCADS

A LARGE CRATE containing cycads native to South Africa was received at the Los Angeles State and County Arboretum last May, a gift of the National Botanic Gardens of South Africa, Kirstenbosch. The plants were sent by the National Botanic Gardens as a contribution to the Arboretum's newest educational resource, the Prehistoric and Jungle Garden. Among the species received, all belonging to the genus Encephalartos, are: horridus, humilis, lehmanii, friderici-guilielmi, trispinosus, arenarius, longifolius, altensteinii, latifrons, and natalensis. Some of

these species cannot be found or purchased in the United States. Together, they represent an important contribution to an Arboretum education program centered in a unique garden that offers students and visitors the opportunity to study plants that have survived in more or less unchanged form for two hundred million years. In addition to observing the living specimens, visitors will be able to observe plants that have evolved through a series of exhibits in the observation deck within the Prehistoric and Jungle Garden.

Because cycads are very slow-growing, it takes many months for them to return to their original growing condition after being moved from their natural habitat. It has been possible to plant three of the cycads received from the National Botanic Gardens in their permanent location in the Prehistoric and Jungle Garden; the remainder are reestablishing their root systems in containers before being planted in the ground.

CAF TRUSTEES

N EW MEMBERS of the Board of Trustees of the California Arboretum Foundation not reported in our last issue are Mr. Harris Newmark and Mr. David

L. Knutson. Mr. Newmark, a stockbroker, is drawn to the Arboretum through his family background. He is the grandson of Harris Newmark, onetime owner of Rancho Santa Anita and the author of the still highly-prized book, "Sixty Years in Southern California." It was the present Mr. Newmark's father and uncle, Marco and Maurice Newmark, who served as editors of the first edition of the book. Mr. Knutson is president of Stover Seed Company, vice-president of the American Seed Association, and has been associated with the seed business practically since his graduation from the University of California, Berkeley, with a degree in agricultural economics. Mr. Knutson is married and has four children.

She worked for a time in the propagation greenhouse and in the herbarium and then served as a school field leader. She was the highly successful chairman of the 1975 Baldwin

Mrs. John (Ellamae) Fehrer was first a member of the Board of Trustees from 1967 to 1973. Because of the nature of his work, he has gardened all over the world. His horticultural activities include the introduction of peanut growing to his friends in Iran. Mrs. Kackley is a volunteer in the Gift Shop.

Mrs. Varick (Diane) Martin has been a member of the Foundation since 1965. An avid gardener, she teaches vegetable gardening in the Arboretum's adult education program. Her ties to the Arboretum are further strengthened through her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Stanton, who is an honorary trustee of the Foundation and who was one of the original Arboretun Councillors in 1950. Mrs. Martin and her husband live in Pasadena. They have a son and daughter.

Mrs. Dennis (Jane) Buck has been a member of the Foundation since 1972.
