RESEARCH DIVISION

For several years the Research Division has offered a helping hand to outstanding students of biology classes at Pasadena High School. Their teacher, Jim Hastings, has contacted us each spring about student science projects working under staff members of the Research Division. Last year we started a weed ecology study on a vacant lot. Each spring, a student interested in this project would identify the different species of weeds and their distribution. This year Sue Crowhurst is covering the project under the direction of Lee Enari. Two other students, Olaf Buchel and Martha Steele, expressed their interest in oak root rot fungus. They are working under the guidance of James Doty and are currently studying our collection of armillaria cultures. There are many strains of Armillaria mellea in the field, which may explain the unlimited host range of this fungus. The students will be looking for and describing variation in growth rate and form in culture.

ARBORETUM DIVISION

Work on the deck adjacent to the Bromeliad Greenhouse should be completed by the time you receive this letter. The deck will serve as a lead from the Demonstration Home Gardens north to the volunteer garden, the adult vegetable garden and, the greenhouses. It was constructed in accord with the aim of dispersing the public to as many points of interest as possible.

All the roads and parking lots at the Arboretum have been sealed and restriping of the parking areas completed.

Additional plantings are being made along Baldwin Avenue between the curb and parking area to bring this area up to the standards of north Baldwin plantings. Work has begun on the new Information Center and completion is expected within 90 days.

Rain has slowed up much of the construction work on the grounds, but in spite of this the pumps are now in operation in Meadow Brook and additional electrical work is underway in that area.

DESCANSO DIVISION

A very successful camellia show was held last weekend attracting 11,783 visitors. We expect a good attendance this weekend, too, when the Southern California Daffodil Show is held in the Gardens.

We've had over 25 inches of rain so far this year with mostly beneficial results. Descanso lilacs should be better than ever because of the heavy rains and should be in full bloom the end of this month and the first two weeks of April. The iris also look especially promising and should hit their peak next month. Gardener Bill Outwin has just returned from a vacation at Disneyland in Florida. He says he still likes Descanso best.

On March 2nd the Camellia Council gave its annual steak dinner for the staff. About 25 people enjoyed this generous event.

The Great Blue Heron currently in residence is still stealing fish from our lake. It is a great sight to watch.

EDUCATION DIVISION

From Palos Verdes to Pasadena, from Pomona to Santa Monica, schools have planted trees given them by your Department. A total of 551 liquidambars went out to the schools of the County. An additional 273 were given for park and campsite planting to the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Campfire Girls of the San Gabriel Valley.
