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My dear friend.

It was under the 20. Jul. that I had the pleasure of writing to you. On the mean time it occurred to me, that the different analyses on the Chemistry of vegetation, which you have given so famously in the american review, merite to be known in our country, and I began to work them over, translating some parts and bringing other nearer to the german agricultural interests. By and by and understood that it would be necessary for this purpose to know Prof Johnson's book in particulars, and I asked Cotta's bookfeller for it. But I received some days ago the news, that Johartor's book is exhausted in England. Therefore I apply to your kindness, begging that you may send me over by way of Mr. Nestler & Welle a copy (^{of Putnam's edition}) so soon as possible. Afterward I shall communicate to you my paper, which is written particularly in the purpose of being useful to our agriculture. I must make you my compliments on account of the lucidity and spirit, with which you have exposed the new doctrines of vegetation. It is indeed a very wholesome and useful task, and I saw by this specimen, that you, my excellent friend, are on a sure and glorious way for popularising science and introducing the newest results of profound investigation to your countrymen, knowledge. In the mean time I did so much as possible for forwarding the generalities of Palmae. I hope you shall not be totally disappointed with the perusal of this last part, which shall yet reach you in this year.

After this there remains for my work the history of spadix flowers and fluid, and a general view of the geographic distribution of Palmae. For this reason, I take th. tibet

of asking your assistance in particular. The matter is, that I do not know well the different species of *Sabal* and *Chamaerops*, which are indicated in your vast country. All I know about the matter is contained in my Palms. Therefore you can easily judge what of novelties you can communicate to me. Pray do not forget my wish!

In the last twice I received a most accomplished collection of East-Indian Palms by poor late Griffith. It was sent from Calcutta in Decbr. 1844 and on the 10. of Febr. the excellent man died at Malacca, leaving a widow, with whom he had himself united on the 21. of Sept. It is indeed a very lamentable event. East India did never see before a Botanist equal to Griffith in profound knowledge of organisation, a better physiologist and observer. Also no other has seen so great a part of the country, from Afghanistan till to the Straits.

You wrote me in your last letter, that you are about of making a new edition of your botanical text book. I am very curious to know what are your new ideas and expositions there. Our science is in a great fluctuation; there are also many great alterations come over our science, especially about the doctrine of the cellule, its nucleus and nucleolus, its division, propagation &c. You will find that Schleiden, Naegeli, Hugel etc have worked about this matter.

I am very thankful to you for the communication of Silliman's Journal. If you are once in the possibility of gaining the first series, I shall happy to receive it, and to send in exchange a complete copy of the Flora, which I shall then beg.

In my former letter I asked to you, whether the copy of the Journal of the Boston of Science and Art, which came to me under my address, without any letter, was destined to me or the Academy.
