Your revision of
Epidotisima came a few days
ago and I had intended to acknowledge
its receipt more promptly.
Accept my thanks. It appears
to be very thoroughly done, &
the plates are a great assis-
tance. I congratulate you
upon the results of your long
labor.

I think I told you that a
part of the Ball Herbarium
had been received here, and
the ~~method~~ ^{method} of its disposal will

need to be settled before long. The only formal applicants for it from this country, so far as I know, were yourself & the Smithsonian Institution. Then the trustees under the will (Harker & Dyer) came to examine the Herbarium they found that it was a far more considerable affair than they had had any idea of. They had it removed to King, and set to work to govern it and take what they wanted, and to have the same done for the Edinburgh Botanic Garden. Then to simplify (for them) the question of how to dispose of the remainder they proposed to send it all to me "leaving it at my discretion to satisfy the claims of St. Louis, Washington, &c." series of specimens under each
species.

In December last they sent me
two cases containing the general
stock of Duplicates, including
some boxes that Mr. Ball had
especially designed for this Her-
barium. Then in March there

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agree upon some one who shall make the distribution into such number of sets as he may find advisable, the first two sets going to Washington & St. Louis, and the rest to other institutions as you may decide, each paying pro rata towards the expense of the distribution. This last arrangement seems to me to be on the whole the best - but some better one may be devised.

I would like the privilege of sharing to some extent in the division. This herbarium is very fairly supplied with European & Mediterranean plants, but we would doubtless find some desiderata in these collections, as Dr. Kew. If this is allowed it will

probably be best that all the work
should be done here.

There is no special need of haste
in making a decision, but it will
be well to come to an understand-
ing, and as the work of division
will take considerable time the sooner
it is begun the better. I shall be
glad to hear from you at your
convenience.
