to send it. Have you any Clematis paniculata growing? It is the  
finest hardy sort I know you trust. The strongest plants are  
grown by grafting it on C. stans. I have the new (?) Clematis  
Addisonii which Mrs. Webb sent me from the Blue Ridge & it  
has stood our winter perfectly.
