

San Luis Potosí Mexico  
May 7<sup>th</sup> 1872

Dear Dr Gray.

Though Mr Parry I send you an occasional reminder of my whereabouts & doings - I am still stuck here in the dry land waiting for rains, only the higher Mts offer any fruitful botanizing. I enclose sketch of Mortonia (figg. 1, 2) I suppose quite new here. I notice the former fruit has 10 well developed seeds - the leaves also not revolute &c &c. The other day I stumbled on the very neat & peculiar Pepatocium mananthum!

I have been studying & sketching Cacti & Agaves for Engel. have a nice apparently new sp of the latter which I want to name A. Engelmanni. - I write often & send encouraging letters, which is quite a treat in this thirsty land. Palmer left today for Mexico, to be gone 2 months will then return here. I shall try & stick a little longer but it is awfully tough and lonely business. I feel however that I am doing some important preliminary work, perhaps laying a stepping-stone to help others. The relation of this table-land flora to Central U.S. is very intimate & suggestive, as I hope to show. - We send occasionally small parcels to Sargent, what he will recognize by Mer. post mark hope some at least may reach him, such parcels as well as printed matter if they go at all go at low rates even 3cts per lb! I hope you will send your printed Curtis to Dr Barroeta, who is

very clever (in the Yankee sense) but of course cannot be depended on for scientific work. Schaffner still holds aloof and I neither see him nor his collections, since he refused me an interview.

Glad to hear from various sources that such important publications in Botany are going on. Shall be delighted to find them on my return. Please remember that mail matter (printed) directed to me at Davenport will be safely taken care of till my return. Duncan Putnam seems still flourishing and really gaining on his disease which is a wonder to all.
