Botanists in drawing up
a local flora, either make

tend to record (i.e. marking
with Greek letters & so on
short characters) varieties
in the large or in the
small genera? Or would
the tendency be to record
the varieties about equally
in genera of all sizes?
Are you yourself conscious
or suspicious, that you have
attended to, & recorded more
