

New York Nov 18<sup>th</sup> 1853

My dear Doctor.

Was it not that Dr. Torrey occasionally says that he "has a letter from Dr. Gray"? I should have no evidence of the existence of that gentleman - Was he forgotten thicker and his Plantae novae? How long before the world will be enlightened by the appearance of the memoir? - I am now quite broken into the routine of the assay office & have no reason to complain of either the tyranny of my chief or the portion of the auric which falls to my share. I suppose that Dr. Torrey mentioned that Gray the Surveyor collected a bundle of snips on his journey to explore the "Moon-shine Rail Road" route - Such specimens! you would think those by Parry perfect monsters after seeing these. A considerable proportion of her collection is exceedingly valuable, being composed of apricots, limes, figs, succulents & other cultivated monstrosities - We seem at

best to have the flowers of my nondescript  
Leguminosæ <sup>(844)</sup> Drct. L. says that you propose  
to call it Olneya if agreeable to me - I cer-  
tainly should be glad to have Col. Olney  
generalized from my collection & if you  
think he would be pleased with the genus  
I hope you will let his name attach -  
he has however always expressed a wish  
to be done into a Cyp. - but I suppose he  
would have to wait until he was nearly 40  
before one would turn up - Tesota, the specific  
name you propose is applied to several hard  
woods, it is from the Spanish Teso: hard,  
tough - Hard Olney! Tough Olney!! - He may  
hardly be willing to be classed with Joe-Boag-  
stocks yet - I send you a few flowers,  
which ~~serve~~ all the stock will afford,  
for your herbarium - I enclose several little  
bits for your decision - An Hosackian which  
I cannot make out - a fragment of  
Stephanthus, apparently yellow, from the  
Orchids. See me - ~~This~~ This by the way is  
my whole stock & a fair sample of the collection.  
A single specimen of a Pittosporum occurs without  
any foliage - it has smaller flowers, shorter  
pedicels & perfectly smooth fruit to distinguish

it from *S. hispidiss.* - but I suppose you will  
consider it a variety of that species -  
and I right in putting down the *Gyroph.* as  
*Fayonia Californiaeum*. Barth's Bernistorff Bot? -

Gray wishes a catalogue of the plants for  
his forthcoming work which is to be published  
on private account & wishes 8 or 10 plates -  
The new parasite will make one & I have  
not concluded upon the others - do you think  
the medium dignified enough to picture  
the Olneya? - Please ascertain if Sprague can  
make 3 or 4 drawings right away -

How come on the Berlandier plants. will there  
be any chance for pickings among the odds &  
ends? - But I have already made more  
? than will be looked upon with! - by anyone  
not botanical. you will much oblige
