My Dear Mr. Watson:

I have another puzzle to lay before you. In Bot. Gaz. 14, Aug. I described *Carex Halliana* from a specimen of Hall's Oregon Coll. which was labelled *C. amplifolia*, evidently by a mistake. Last winter among Mr. Bennett's *Canices* at Providence I found the same plant labelled *C. Oregonensis*, Olney, in Olney's writing. *C. Oregonensis* was published without description in Proc. Am. Acad.



1872, p. 470, upon no. 605- of  
Hall's Coll. During my visit  
to Providence this week I over-  
hauled all of Olney's Herb. I had  
not seen it before. It contains  
no *C. Oregonensis*. But it does  
contain the ~~same~~ plant  
labelled *C. Hallii* n. sp. Now  
this explains a circumstance  
in Herb. Gray: my *C. Halliana*  
was there labelled *C. amphifolia*  
and a specimen of *C. amphifolia*  
was labelled *C. Hallii*. Olney evi-  
dently made two names <sup>*C. Hallii + C. Oregonensis*</sup> for the  
same plant. There is nothing  
in Herb. Torrey to help me  
out. Which name should  
stand?

I found some *Carices* in  
Herb. Olney which will explain one  
or two doubtful ones in Herb.
