My Dear Mr. Watson:

I have been giving some attention to our cultivated dewberry or flat, and I am satisfied that it is specifically distinct from both *R. Canadensis* and *R. villosa*. I think that I shall call it *R. Hortensis*. You may recollect that we found a single specimen of it in your collection, in the *R. trivialis* cover. I wish that you would tell me where that specimen is from, and also if you will express your opinion as to its relationship with *R. trivialis*. I have no good specimens of *R. trivialis*.

The Lucreta dewberry, the leading variety cultivated, was picked up wild in W. Virginia.
