over the same ground, my notes will hardly
be of much value - Besides it has not been us-
ual to print more than simple lists in the
Gov't. Reports and my notes would make
considerable bulk, if included.

There are several plants in De Torrey's list which seem to be particularly interesting in regard to locality or other particulars, and as you make a special study of those north of the Columbia I have thought it well to give you a list of these. You may wish to see the specimens or to have some, which I will be happy to furnish you with. I also wish to ask you as to the identity of some which do not agree with description exactly and which you may have named otherwise in collections from the north — I suppose many of them have been before obtained there, but I must say those I have no accounts of, not knowing what may prove interesting to you.

If I am not mistaken the true *leiorrhiza sericea* is abundant there unless what I take for it is your *le. drummondii*. *le. pubescens* is certainly very distinct.

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I have however begun such a list as you mention including all the plants from the two sides of the Cascade Mts, in two separate articles, as they are so markedly distinct.

I have got on with it to *Thymelaeaceae*, and have found considerable to add and correct in the Fl. of A.C. but when I get to the *Ranunculaceae* orders after *Compositae* I have nothing to guide me in any selections further. I will try however to honor Hooker's Fl. Bon and perhaps Dr Torrey will assist me in these.

I have already written something on the character of the country in connection with its flora etc and will be able to add more.

I should be very glad to see your articles on Hooker's works in *Silliman's Journal*, and will try to get the numbers containing them.

I hope my very neophytic remarks may be of interest to you as you say; but I know the danger of theoretical speculations in Natural Sciences even from my short experience, and

mean to avoid them as much as I can
I have tried. I gave to Dr Torrey to send
you ~~with the specimens of Astragalus~~ and
he must have forgotten or mislaid them
I will see him about it before long; but
as you wished to make some corrections per-
haps it would be best for you to write him.

Practicing in a country town I have very
little opportunity to see rare books, but
hope to spend some time in Washington
before long when I can refer to some that
I have much wished to see, to settle doubts.
I would also like much to confer with the
botanists of the Expl. Exped. on my plants

In comparing my specimens of *Spiraea*
Douglasii with *S. townsendia*, I see the differ-
ences mentioned very plainly & have noted sev-
eral not in your accounts. But undoubted
specimens of *S. Arvensis* in my coll. seem
to connect both these and *S. Salicifolia*, all
together, as you have suggested their alliance.

I shall have some doubtful cases to trouble
you with & press before long. Yours respectfully
