My dear Gray

Immediately on receiving  
your note enclosed to Brother Wootton  
to Kippist the Librarian of the Linnean  
Society and ascertained that ~~they~~ two  
several copies of the Linnean Journal  
No 9 (a complete & good) were  
delivered in the usual manner ~~add'd~~  
to you at Trimbos on the 21<sup>st</sup> August  
& then wrote to Trimbos and encl.led  
his answer upon which you can  
make the necessary enquiries at  
Monroe & C<sup>o</sup>; I trust you will find  
the parcel safe there.

I am afraid you will be much  
disappointed when you see my paper  
which is explanatory of my Handbook  
for our excellent friend Wootton has made  
some mistake. The part relating to  
geographical distribution - which only  
contains a few general hints - has  
not yet been read - what I have read  
has only been some remarks on the  
terminology of duration bracts and  
fruits and on my ideas of genera  
and species - I expect to read the

geographical distribution part (which I have just written out) at our first Feb meeting - some of the detailed notes on individual species which conclude the paper are not quite finished yet when it will be printed I do not know I fear it is too long for the journal and will probably make a supplemental part next year.

I have been detained an unenviable time at two Dalbergian genera *Machoerium* & *Lonekocarpus* - of the latter I have been obliged to examine over and over again specimen after specimen till I am quite sick of it - so difficult to match flower and fruit - and fruits so different other flowers & leaves to all appear same. I have been obliged to suppose *Sphinctolobium* and *Sturoscapha* and it is with great difficulty I can keep *Derris* and *Lonekocarpus* distinct & only by putting *d. pterocarpus* and *d. longifolius* (B.L.) into *Derris* and some sister & African ones into *Lonekocarpus* but I do not see my way quite clear yet. It is very difficult also to distinguish *Glechidea* from *Melletta* and I believe *Otoemua* cannot stand - and all these

but with more or less dehiscence pads come very near your *Wisteria* which however I have not yet studied well - At any rate I think that *Melletta* must be expelled from *Dalbergiaceae*. A. de Candolle has got *Melletta* his *gloriosa* if not present herbaceous keeper to do the So take in hand the *Euphorbiaceae* for the *Prodromus*. He will have much to do to reconcile Klotsch and Baillon who are both to publish their species (in opposition to each other I suppose) this summer. It is a pity so fine a family should be so hacked. A. D. is now finishing the *Begonias* and is then going to do the *Cupuliferas* in order to bring them out with *Anderman's Willow* - Meissner is advancing in the *Caesalpiniaceae*.

I trust we shall soon have Prof. Hooker's *Introduction* to his *Ternstroemian Flora* - with some startling facts in geographical distribution. He has I believe been working it out with great care. We want something rational for a redaction after Agardhi's Negliflown display of imagination.



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
