My Dear Prof. Oliver

Yours of Oct. 30th is

I have not acknowledged an
earlier note of yours, but I trust
I have. You ask now I am
off for Mt. Helena Plate. I have
none at all, i.e. nothing of its
indigenous flora. So I shall be
glad enough to get the offered du-
plicates of Bouchelle's coll.

"I have to send them, and the
Sandwich Id. parcel." They
would reach you promptly if sent
to Tribune St., or to Prof. Worcester.
But as Dr. Steyer, among the
rest of his amazing partiality and
kindness to me, has given directions
to have a set of duplicate Pine Cones,
Ls. selected for me, from any specimens
labeled of the Museum. I suppose all
together would soon warrant the
sending of a small case by the R.
R. steamer.

Thanks for the 3 pamphlets just
received from you. The notes on
Bixineae (Pyramideocarps, &c.) are

Very interesting. I have all along thought Buchanan could not sustain his distinction between Sangdei & Bixineae, and sticked to his view. He was lead to take that view, I suppose by the strong desire to keep up marked distinction between hypogynous & perigynous orders, - which would be very convenient if it could be done. But it will break down every way. Your discovery of Pyrrosia-carpis will master the inevitable result, and restore Sangdei to Bixineae in the Ges. Pl.

About the Japan things, I am having the set of Oldham's all put in order, & bring together with them what I have lately received from Leyden Museum. And as I put them away in to boxes I shall have a body of notes to send you. Between Miguel & Maxianovite, there is likely to be publication enough on Japan botany for the present.

As to the Sandwich Isd. plants, I mean promptly to send you notes of the collation of them with my materials, and to collate Mauris' things at the same time, - securing for you a suite of all of Mauris' that you can need, whenever he has reflected. Thus far I have seen only his Courea

Prinice, - not so many nor so good specimens as I expected.

I encourage & shall help H. Mann to draw up, with a list of his own plants, a full one of all known Hawaiian plants, - partly to anticipate Semenov, who is, I see, disposed to meddle with that flora. My Hesperevermannia (Mutisias) I will print immediately, along with some new California Composita. You are quite right to publish your Begonias, and I suppose you will, of course, call it Hillebrandia. He will deserves it. There is no reason you should hesitate to bring out anything you wish, on H. Mann's account. I hope he will do something; but he is young, untried, and without claims wh. should stand in your way at all. We would be ever pleased that you should not publish what you like of Sandwich Isd. botany, without referring to him.



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
