is to ask you, if you

could send me, early
this autumn - say in
a month, a fair quantity
of live roots of
Cypripedium spectabile
and of C. arietinum,
for our garden.

I should be glad to
depay all the trouble
and expense, and to
have - say a dozen
or more of bunches of
roots of the two species -
packed in moss.

Mr. Rithwick has
enlisted in a Pennsylv-
ania regiment, and is
on the Potomac
