My Dear Doctor

Let me report progress. You know the date of my departure from New York and probably that of my arrival in Galveston. I took the first boat for Houston. Unable to transport my baggage by stage I put it on a road-waggon, unfortunately overloaded and with a weak team. By a blunder of the driver he started on the wrong road, and one as bad as roads ever get to be. The result was he was obliged to hire himself hauled out of the mud into the right road, and on that we had divers unloading and reloadings to perform on our way up. I footed it through mud and water and had a fair chance to botanize for aquatics or amphibia.

I stopped a few days with my friends at Cutersville and then got here some day before the waggon On my way up and here I collected some 250 species probably which will furnish some 2000 specimens some how rather bad - injured by rain and wet of which we had a plenty. They are mostly old and known plants but will do for exchange.

I have been here a week and have now ascertained that on Monday next or soon thereafter a waggon will start for San Antonio and the Quartermaster a Springfield man Mr Chapman has promised me transportation. I have a letter to Gen. Kearney which I hope will secure me transportation if not subsistence to El Paso. I intend to procure one to Major Henry which will secure me his favor and assistance.

The train will leave San Antonio on the 1st prox and Mr Chapman says will be three months on the route - \$300 per month - ample leisure to botanize by the way. I find no letter in Galveston and my suspense about my last year's collection of plants is quite distressing.

If you're in Houston the small box of lathers collected two or three
winter ago at Seguin I gave is a start and take it to go

When arrived here, I hastened to hunt up my box. It seems that
the Cholera almost wholly cut off communication with Houston
and it was sent to Port Lavaca by a very good friend of mine
and was (nearly) safely deposited there. I have written a letter of
enquiry to the house that should have shipped it. My trunk
was also sent on with it probably at my request for which I am
sorry as it contains nothing but my letters and papers, some cloth-
ing and a variety of little trinkets such as an Bachelor may
be supposed to have about him. You may keep it till I send for
it. These things should have reached you long ago as they
were deposited for shipment late in Janua or early in Feb.

I want you to order to my friend, Hugh Mc Clure, Austin,

to it and Mr. Mc Clure will pay me the money on demand. -

My paper was considerably injured and diminished in
quantity by abrasion when met in loading & unloading and rolling
against the other articles in the waggon. You had better send
me at some time before winter a good supply for next year
and be careful if it should cost a few dimes more fit well
be economy in the end to have it well sewed up in strong canvas
and in parcels of such size as to be easily handled
This and any thing else you may send had better be addressed
to Wm Hildreth & Co Galveston & Hugh Mc Clure Austin
and I think they will come safely

My health is pretty good, I was considerably reduced by hard fare
on ship-board. I don't know what else it was for I weathered the
voyage without seasickness. Our accommodation, even evocable
Scouts go a steamer passage with ten times as much comfort

Please for a remark on Gamma trifida I have found it in one

its deviation from the normal form be the effect of transplating?

I may have to lay in provision at San Antonio to El Paso
and join some of the messes of privates unless some of
the officers should take a liking to me as I hope they will
and it may diminish my expenses. These have been rather
greater than I expected. My trip to N. York and back to
Wethersfield early in March, Hotel bill for several days about
the 1st Apr., my passage money not 25 dol. but 27 1/2. Hospital
money at Galveston, wharfage, storage, a rayage, tavern expenses,
passage & freight to Houston. & a repetition of like little charges
then with my expenses up the country though I have tried to be
economical have considerably reduced my funds. Still I think
I will have enough for the present campaign & if you will have
arrangements made to supply me for the rest I think I will be
able to do something handsome for yourself and other friends.

You need not hope to hear from me again before I arrive at
El Paso unless something very important should occur.

does not need confirmation and breeding confirmation requires
the trophus to make a return and then gathering spores to see if
any is to have a good dispersal and to determine a habitat.
The first stage of reproduction growth will continue and out of
judgement I hope it is not planned at any time to move its
habitat of roosts while increasing in population, possibly
if emigration would be seen it is more in the best
long term interest of flocks to let them spread out
wherever and settle amongst other flocks of the same
or different species. It is first well thought out where
