that I cant now recall to mind.

My Dear Dr

I write at a venture hoping  
you may be safely returned by the time  
this note reaches you - I wrote to you  
from Yukodadi or from Petropavelski  
or both - I made but a small col-  
lection at the latter place. We had a  
slow passage toward the straits. A  
land party was left there under the com-  
mand of Lieut. Cook the Astronomer  
consisting of Mr. Kern, Artist, Mr. Stimp-  
son and myself a small main gun  
& seamen - in all about a dozen of us.  
Here we spent a month and I made  
I hope a pretty thorough but very local  
collection of about 350 sp (the lower orders  
calculated by the rule of guesswork) We  
had a rather long passage hither  
when I found your hurried letter on  
the eve of your departure for Europe.

(P.S. (it went yesterday Oct 17)

And now about that valuable package  
of books & the A.B. Palmer was in  
Hong Kong on our arrival or during  
our stay and I made all inquiries for  
my property that the extreme indeterminate-  
ness of my information allowed. If  
you had given me one external  
mark by which it might be rec-  
ognized and claimed I could have  
gone forward confidently in my  
search. As it was I could only say  
"It has had time enough to reach here"  
and "it has probably been shipped" and  
"it was probably directed to me though  
possibly for securing better attention  
to the Commander" or "it may have  
been consigned to a Mercantile house  
here" but I did not know to which  
if any &c &c. Thus you can but see  
that it may have been near by and I  
unable to recognize it. I have pre-

pared a letter which I shall send by  
first ship to R.P. Desilver Naval  
Storekeeper Hong Kong giving him  
the little information I possess —  
the name of the ship which carried  
it and the contents of the package —  
and have asked him to look out for it  
and take care of it for me if found.  
Allow me to suggest that if you  
will communicate to him any other  
information as the direction direc-  
tion or any external mark it may  
facilitate the recovery of the package  
I hope if not found I shan't have to  
pay all the freights!! Rather poor  
comfort for the loss of a couple hundred
