

House, Verde, Apr. 24th 1849

Dear Doctor

I am almost as happy as a clam
at high tide, & should be quite if I had got any
good news from home along with yours of the 30th
ult. I have written to you frequently of late always
in a doctorous mood. I don't know what has bewitched
our correspondence unless it is filibusterism. I wish
it was beheaded. You must have missed some of my
letters as I certainly gave you directions how
to write. However — you will not be far wrong
if you direct to Santa (or Sta for short) Catalina de Guad-
tanimo. If you want to ensure certainty & avoid all risk
of the letters being opened you may send under cover to
Mr. J. Descaulle, or Messrs. Brooks & Co. The things
sent through Bressler & Giraudy come promptly.
They are clever fellows.

I think I know where I got that Polypoda but
I may not be able to find it again. I shall look out
sharp for all fruits.

Of all those little Hymenophyllaceae things I believe
I have the time enough for full distribution. Some
of the ferns are yet dragging along — one specimen
at a time but I have a goodly number with the
complement of 40 specimens. *Ophioglossum palmatum*
is indeed *planta rarissima* but I think I shall be
able to supply the demand. At least I hope so. I
have 27 specimens & I am up to its habits now & know
when to look for it. It has been very dry lately & I have
done but little among the ferns but I have been deep into
the lichens. I have lately collected two *Bignoniaceae* plants
which are certainly not in our cases. I got the other

day wood of Tanacetum. D. Is that queer enough for you? The little flowers resemble Santana. I fear you will get no more of it. I took all I saw at the time & I have not found it since, though I have been on the look-out for it whenever I have been in that locality. When you have all the specimens before you, you may be able to do better with it.

The paper is in Cuba. I have not read it yet. I have the glass & find it quite useful.

Go soon on Mrs. Gray if you can not come yourself I will meet her in Cuba & escort her here when she will be at home as I am. She shall have as many bananas as she wants & any other fruit to which she takes

part. I have a list of the former list of ferns & the paper on the paper ferns. Exp. Exp. I have come with your letter. I am very glad to get anything of the sort and have a kind of natural curiosity to know what I am doing in the world. If among the pebbles & trash I pick up here and there, any gold or diamonds are ~~found~~ I am gratified to be informed of the fact. I have most of my plants snugly packed up & ready to distribute into their natural families & ready for ship next when a Boston vessel turns up. I have been rather hotting back waiting for letters - perhaps a little silly. I don't know as I can do much while to do, because I got ~~nothing~~ ^{nothing} however I think I will take them in a few days to Salted up & if there is no immediate prospect of a Boston ship I will send them to New York.

Exp. Exp. in shipping Mrs. G. here. I don't know as over to you that Mr. L. once has a Mr. Leonard's lady - Boston people - several months with him & he always speaks of that time in the terms most expressive of his gratification & every earnest desire from their society.

It seems that I brought home materials with which Beck & Curtis have made quite a flourish. If I have done as well in the other departments of cryptogamy, I shall get a name as a collector as any rate. I only regret that I could not visit localities offering in Phanogamy more novelty. But such localities nowadays are hard to find in the course of a sea-voyage & nobody will ever again have such chances as Shank's islands & those other old voyagers enjoyed.

I hope you got the money to pay Beckley before Worche Sam stopped payment. I thought such special appropriations as the one coming to us were exempt from application to any other purpose. But I suppose at Washington nothing yellow is safe from the light-fingers & gentry that prowled about there.

Do Spizelard publishing anything as he goes along & if so, what is the chance to get possession of the sheets as they are issued. If I am doing anything of importance I like to see it in print as it goes along. All posthumous credit I may get for collecting won't do me any good.

25th This is the first real rainy & dourly foggy day we have had in a long time. It will start the crypts again. It is snout time for trees in general to begin to blossom.

I shall calculate on Mrs. Gray coming on soon just as Mr. L. did on me & then of course when she is tired of Monte Verde you will come on & botanize awhile & take her home.

My best wishes for her restoration to health.
