ago. Well after many delays
& disappointments it is pretty
well concluded that I set out for
Mayari day after tomorrow. I
get from here transportation &
guidance as far as Sagua de Ma-
a no - two day journey thence to
Mayari two days more I must hire
But now for the first time I learn
that there are no savanas at May-
ari nor between here & there but I
have no doubt they will be found
not far beyond. I must go and see
doing the best I can for I can get
no satisfactory information by en-
quiry. I have now what is said
to be a good horse - & he ought to be
for when mounted I am seated on
\$150 counting in horses in trading
& in being sold & I don't suppose
any one could be found nearly enough

To give me \$100. I never was made
for a horse trader. I believe I wrote
you that some thing took my saddle
a few days ago & I had to buy an
other = \$20 Umbrella = 7 Do Shoes 400
& other things in like ratio - So
the money goes. However I have
something more than \$100 in gold
& think I can venture away among
strangers with that sum. I have
thus far found friends & expect to
meet with others. Mr. Lescaille
sent from France a barrel full
of seed mostly = beans peas & other
garden seeds also dalias. The
ship unloaded at Caba came to
Guantanamo to load & has been
some time gone & today, only after
long search & many enquiries
these seeds have come to hand. Because
it was not coffee. It was a horse potato
sugar or coffee or something else
~~it~~ closely connected with the
staple interests of the country it

collections. It has received me already
of about \$20 within three or four days.
I have a boil which hinders the
saddle - else I should go today
to the pinal - 2 leagues distant. I can
see it on the crest of a pretty high
range of hills. It is said to be open
but it differs from ours in the sit-

is a large Sabanna between here
& Teaba which I propose next to
visit. Then I can soon decide what
course to take. You must not be sur-
prised to see me in early autumn.

Vegetation all along the road is
very fresh & here also. I believe I
have stumbled upon the best season
for my trip. - There is no inn here
I eat at the house of Don Elias Vidal
to whom I had an introductory letter
but his house is full & filling for his
lady ^{* (today - yesterday she was absent)} who is in bed with her 17th of not 18th
child (she has had 3 pair twins). I sleep in my
hammock in a neighboring house ^{or shanty with a ground floor}. Mrs.
Lopez would not call my accommodations
comfortable. I dare say if she had

to inhabit them Nothing more
at present. The mail leaves
tomorrow morning
