

Monse Vnde Jan 1906 1861

My Dear Dr

Yesterday came yours of the 28th ult
I was almost in despair. Every thing seemed
lagging. My brother is in arrears. Two num-
bers of the Courier stopped below (we got them
last night) Now however I am a little picked up.
You will see by my last letters that I try
to give you as good as you send in politics.
You say "we are in the midst of Treason and
Secession". Secession I admit - Treason no.
S. Carolina is not waging war on the W. S. nor
giving aid & encouragement to her enemies.
She asks only to be "let alone". Mr Lincoln is
beginning early to show his colors. He has better
beware. Let him not imagine himself omnipo-
tent. He must consult the Senate before he
attempts to coerce S. Car. Should he make this
trial will he find in the north volunteers enough
to whip S. Car? All he ~~wants~~^{will} enlist will be
mad fanatics whose highest ambition is to
steal a nigger. You wish S.C. was in the
middle of the Gulf Stream! Allow me to wish
that your Beechers, Sumners & hoogey own
were in Bedlam the proper place for them.
If you don't like this political sparring just
remember that you began it.

I have run over your resume of the dis-
tribution & it would appear that including all
the ?? ?? & Harveys set (given?) the value of the
whole is about \$1300 - not a very profitable
business after deducting expenses. There
remains however some 15-20 sets of ferns not

included in the account of the mosses Lichens & Fungi - & I never got any thing for them. Your letter partly explains the small number of some of the fern sets. I suppose when I can send to Leaba I shall get a full explanation.

I was so much vexed at what I thought an unreasonable delay in giving me at least a brief explanation of this matter that I had almost come to the determination not to send home any more. They are scattered too - some at Bradford - some in Caln - some at N. Phila & some here. I doubt very much whether I can make out "good new numbers". I can't say now when I shall get them all together.

You believe Sullivan is at work on the mosses I suppose so. At least he managed to write me. To that effect at the same time acknowledging his remissness. They say "confession is good for the soul" Sullivan's confession is good for nothing in my opinion. Whenever his report is published I hope you will secure me several copies. I want to give some to my friends here. He thinks me a "capital fellow." Sorry I can't return the compliment. You call him a good fellow. His goodness so far as I can see is scattered about in spots few & far between & small as that. I have never hit upon one yet.

I wrote lately a long letter to Baird giving him too a blowing up for promising to send me certain things & failing to comply

or at least giving me no clue to find the things sent. I enclose a line to him which you can read if you will. Please forward it. Eaton promised me some remarks on such ferns as are insufficient in number, but I find nothing from him except the sketch of the enumeration. If he dilly-dally's off in this fashion he need not write at all for I shall be on my way home before his list of desiderata starts.

I wrote to Baird something in this manner to show him how I have been victimized for two years. First my letters during the first six months were lost (my own neglect). Then my brother sent me a box of clothing - lost. Then I asked you for Madell-Aus. "you'll have to wait till you come home to study work." Next Baird sends me a box of bottles & months clapsed before I found them. He neglected to advise me when they were sent. About a year ago I asked you for money & gave you directions how to send. You saw fit not to follow them & I was bankrupt for a good while. Then you were going to send me some books presently - I have just now got them. But not the "4 great Dickmans" (never mind this). Again in remitting me money Mr L. left ~~in~~ the signature to his endorsement in the inkstand & I had to work on borrowed money which did not hold out quite so well as I could have desired. Again Prof Baird (10th Oct) promises to send in a few days a double barrelled gun & some fine shot. This is all I know about it. There!! if that is not a sufficient list of grievances for two years I'd like to know what is.

I lay out the "stolen saddle" in its proper

where Mr L. is going to cut down a
large piece of wood. It is the best chance
that I now see of doing any thing in botany.
