

Habana July 27th 1864

My Dear Dr

I came here the 21st. My package of plants or the receipts for them did not reach me till the 23d. It was then too late to go for them that day & the next day was Sunday. Monday was a "fiesta" & I didn't get them till yesterday. They are now in boxes & nearly ready for shipment.

Some time ago I sent to the city your draft on Hamburg. Nobody would have it. I had however some hope that with my explanations I could sell it. All in vain. All business between this city & Hamburg is done in "Monobanco". When then the bill was presented to the merchants ~~thoughts~~ they did not say "you are a fool or a swindler". Mr Brooks offered to endorse the bill & nobody would buy it on those terms. I borrow money to come home "home on it" — I am so lucky as to get away.

The next thing after getting my things in hand was to look after my passport. I went to an agent in this business. who told me it would be necessary to send to Yateras = Guantaaamo for a pass which short state that I was a bachelor & that I wanted to go home. This was not to be thought of — better give up the trip at once. Prof. Baird procured me a letter of recommendation from the Spanish minister in Washington to the Captain General here but till now I have not presented it. I resolved to do it now little as I like to go about or have any trouble to with these "big bugs". I went yesterday but it was late. I went again this morning according to advice given yesterday. I returned, as I went the "big bug" was too

busy to devote any time to little bugs. I shall go again tomorrow & if lucky enough to get a pass I hope to embark for home the day following.

I don't wish Mr. Eaton any harm. I would even risk much to shield him from it but I would rather like the fun of seeing just in my situation for a half hour. Maybe he won't not be so hard on me for "growing". However bad as my situation is I <sup>would</sup> not swap it for his - "wallowing rebels". I must say you've been unlucky in your efforts to help me along. We must study up some plan for the future before I return.

I am very kindly treated by my friends here Grindelach. Don Lennion & Cadula & a few others. Were it not so the filthy place would be quite unendurable. I never want to see ~~the~~ <sup>it</sup> again if I can see my friends out of it.

28th My passport is in my pocket book - my plants are bared up & marked consigned to Westermann. No money enough to come home on and some to spend (borrowed) & now nothing remains but to get my ticket for the steamer & go on board tomorrow. The plants however will not be shipped till day after tomorrow on another steamer - Mr. Brooks thinking there would be hardly time to ship on the steamer for tomorrow.

Please write me as soon as convenient. Tell me if you can accommodate me a day or two without inconvenience till we can make other arrangements. I have little idea how long I shall be detained in Cambridge never having distributed any collection of much magnitude. I shall want to spend a few days at home of course. Kind regards to Mrs. & Miss <sup>July</sup> Wright
