

Santa July 24th 1865

Dear Dr.

Just got yours of the 4th & 12 inst with inclosures which have been read and the letter to Dr. Hooker is written but I was a little too late to send it today to Matanzas by mine host who only stayed a short hour and returned to the city. I have found another San Marcos only more so. I had heard of the titos of Camarionca" since I have been in the island. I was told by Gundlach that it was a place of strange vegetation but I did not imagine that it was so similar to San Marcos. But it is not at the foot of Cajalbana with its pines. ~~—~~ yet it gives me additional oddities. Randia with its rectangular ramification and other like Rubiaceae. leomintia idem Rhedia with leaves like a penknife low stiff little-leaved Amapighias ~~shrub~~ To tie together all these rectangles and how is a body to get through it? True it isn't very tall climbing to go over it but then it tangles the legs tears the ankles pricks the fingers and even scratches the face. I have only once been in it and once on the edge of it - an ante-breakfast job. Today I have been drying and casting and writing letters. I came here only five or six days ago. But perhaps I had better begin at the beginning. Well I was some days detained there a prey to mosquitos and heat. At Palma Sola fresh air & sea-bathing ad lib. to offset good eating without ~~stint~~ stint. We feasted sumptuously every day when it all comes from I can't see only on the sea-side. That was plain enough. I had all the other side to botanize in - not so much botany as work. But I got some novelty - an Zoniidium - one of the rectangular sort and multiangular too if ramosississississimum can make it ~~so~~. An Aristolochia looks newish. You shall have enough of Lithophiles too - if it be really that which I think it is though I don't quite

agree with Grisebach's description. I shall probably have means to upset if they are not already, done some of the sp. of *Sesuvium*. But I got in Matanzas a Portulaca not in Gris nor Reich though agreeing very well with a sp. in Dr. Proh (I can now recall the name). And what is queer of *Chenopodi*, abounds here reported from New Jersey and N. Mexico also from Siberia - *Tetragynia* etc. so far as I can make it out without fr. (ripe or villigating) - ovaries only.

Morales has made a new genus of palms on *Araucaria laiuspatha*. He calls it *Gastromerces armatus*. I may send you his character some other day.

I stayed some ten or twelve days with Don Jose Garcia at Palma Lola and with Pepe a jolly old soul who takes short strolls where the walking is smooth swinging about his semi-paralytic arm and leg. His right side is partially paralytic he writes with his left hand and straight down the page like the Chinese or he turns the paper sideways to him - the lines running up & down. Yet he has done a great deal to illustrate the nat. Hist. of Cuba. His forte is fishes. Butterflies & shells have also received considerable attention from him. But he felt the effects of the good living at Palma Lola. He found it hard to resist the temptation of any new dish set before him and went to sleep soon after eating - whether pretending to study or surrendering like a man Morpheus asserts his claim.

The day after my arrival here mine host Don Felix Garcia went with me to the books and I gathered hastily a good many things for examination. We returned to breakfast & the next day I went alone and spent a good half-day. My paper is full but I can take out some dry plants tomorrow and I mean to go for another load. There is one minor success last quite new to me and to my regret I have yet seen on it no fl. or fr. and I fear I must defer to another time a supply of specimens from it. The little *Rhusia* has

nothing but leaves. At San Marcos I got it with fr. It I have not yet seen. A *Rhamnace* is here again in fr. if indeed it be the same which I got in I. Maron - though this has no important character. This I do not remember as belonging to that. Two little bags *Burserias* do not agree with those in Pl. Mr. C. Little Comp. quite new to me cost me a long search and I have not yet enough. An *Oreaster* looks new. It is queer that I can not determine hardly any of the Cuban *Oreasters* by the characters in Gris.

I should not be surprised to learn that the Cuban gentleman in negotiation with Grisebach is Mr. Sauvage.

I have a bit project in hand I have made a proposition to Baird, Bryant, Blana Seudder Coneson &c and others who have received presents of shells birds insects &c for Gundlach to contribute each something to be used in the purchase of a small library to be presented to him as a token of respect for his character as a man and for his industry in the cause of science. I headed the subscription with fifty dollars and authorized any one of the subscribers properly qualified by the rest to act for them to call on you for my subscription.

I don't see how I can possibly send plants as you suggest to Grisebach. The box is in Matanzas I have not there your specimen room to distribute in and to make sufficient numbers. It would be a tedious everlasting task and I dare not undertake it. I have been thinking that when I return to Matanzas I will send to you all I have ^{They will be safer from insects and water} I have. Then will be a good many novelties and it would be well he had them. But I can not ask you to take upon you the task which I so much dread. and then will it not delay for half a year his catalogue which I do long to have. And after all then must be supplement after supplement before the Flora can be any thing like complete and why worry ourselves to finish at once a work which from its very nature and the few laborers engaged

in it must be progressive and arrive slowly at perfection
I am among excellent kind people and what is more to
the purpose rich and able to help along a poor fellow and
this I little thought to stay away from Retiro and friend
Blain so long here I am and I suspect I shall stick
a while yet to these briars

I have been working at Tillandsias and wondered that I couldn't
make them out. Grisebach's first set. has one character which I
suspect is ^(just now discovered) wrong & so it is the cause of my failure. "Filaments
spirally twisted" I suspect should be "stigmae sp. tw." Running
over the sectional characters and seeing that one and not seeing
in any sp. the stam. twisted I went on & through with the idea
"well! it is not in Gris." I have just collected *Pisonia inermis*?
I got it at Guantánamo and it went home in the ^{second} lot of plants
from Club. Dr. I got it at Sagua de Tánamo - Mr. Revels I got it at
Cajabón and now I have it again. Why is Gris so reticent about
naming it? There will be enough of this anyhow.

29th Got another Tillandsia yesterday - Stem not twisted. These
thickets have a *Plumiera* which differs in some respects from
any one in Gris. They all have a very similar general appearance
but the texture of the leaves and their perfect smoothness and want
of prominence of the veins with some slight floral differences
in the flower may serve to distinguish it specifically.

and a return to duty with recruited health and strength
