Dear Dr

I believe I sent you a little commelynaeum plant in considerable quantity which Griseb. has not reported or certainly. With the look of Commelyna it has the fl. of Tradescantia in the bract of the former. petiole filaments (6) anthers transverse oblong linear orange 2-celled cells 2-ovulate. Leaves small $\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{3}{4}$ inch at base ^{and beneath} ~~hippotion~~ above sheath long villous sepals whitish pet. ^{ovate} ^{and orange} white. not common but seen abundantly in our localities. I brought some & it is now growing here so that I have fresh flowers to examine

and now I beg you will enlighten me on a char. of Bromeliaceæ. During all the years I have been studying botany the terms accumbens & incubent as applied to the embryo of bromeliads havent got through my wool. I took in the book and see the little diagram = which is accumbent and the other = which is incubent I close the book and an hour afterward I dont know which is which. Now Grisebach had introduced one of these abominations into Bromeliaceæ and gives us "anthers erect" & "anthers incubent". I havent the slightest idea what this last can mean Please do me a kindness by explaining it — In a late excursion toward the coast I got a new Nymphaea, a new Spilidium & a new Ruellia & I believe a new Thunberg besides collecting a good many things which I cant make out. I am pretty sure I have Peskletsia penta spuma At all events it agrees in every particular with the description.

There is a huge plant here comparable in size & appearance to sugar cane I dont know the fl. Is it Reinmaria acuta Yd.? I have been examining Rondelia? Timolia, Gr. The fl. has not the callous ring in the throat. Cures septicide & half-loculicide. Ought not Ferdinandea to be merged in Rondelia or form a section of it?

Friend Blain in his studies of the Sphingidae makes some good observations. Thus the tobacco-worm lives indistinctly on Tobaccos, tomato, Lapsiaceum Potato, Datura, Another Sphix lives on Rue & on the orange. Another lives on Vitex & on Sesamum. Is this a hint? "Consider the butterflies how they live." Sesamum has been tossed about a good deal. May not the insects have a voice in deciding where it belongs. Were having a spell of weather I caur dry my

paper so fast as I would nor get into the hills comfortably.
Don Jose has a plant of *Calasetum tridentatum*? with fine
well opened flowers. The sensitiveness of the antenna is not observable
& name it doubtfully as it has not the edge of the lobellum dentated
agrees exactly with the fig. in Darwin in all other respects except per-
haps in the tip of the anther being shorter & more curved — In these
last days I have saved two new sp. of *Gnetaea* unless one be as
probable enough *G. trijida* Rich

25th Today about midday two of the fl. of *Calasetum* discharged their pollen
in with force on being tickled

Here is a little Rhynchosporion which I can't make out. It is strange if my
previous collections do not contain it as it abounds in certain peculiar spots
here just under my nose. Please compare with your specimens & tell me if you
have it.

27th Yesterday I went where the mayoral of Balestena is cutting ~~down~~
the wood on the top of the mountain back of the house. I got a new
species of *Tubaria*? — I guess from its resemblance to the others —
(I have no gen. char. of the genus) & a brand new *Arceuthobium* grow-
ing on *Phoradendron repens* & this on *Alchornea* or an *Ole-
aceaphne*. Latey I have saved fl. of *Cnidodesmus arbuscula* ^{Mr} (old
(old leaf. Pl. but) & tomorrow si vis hinc I'll see if the trees have
produced any more. I got plenty of *Micromis Rangeliae*. It is the
largest Malastom. I know - a small tree

28th The *Lemidodiscus* has not produced any more fl. — Mr. Lea is gone
to New York. I hope you'll hear from him ^{if you do} if not soon. It will
be a good chance to send me anything you may have for me. I
sent him an introductory note to Dr. Torrey. I found another
locality near here of *Fragaria? gracilis* but without fl. or fr.
When does it blossom?
