

La machine Oct 10th 1866

Dear Dr.

The sawmill & its vicinity proved such good botanizing ground that I am back again a week and more. And I haven't exhausted the field yet. I have at least four new species of Noticolaria and two other, or more Restiaceæ - *paeplatanthus* & *Criscantor*. I have been examining anew *Richardsonia mucicata* Gr. I see yet no signs of the circumscissile falling of the calyx-tube & except the form of the flower-head it has all the characters of *Diodia*. But I have a true *Richardsonia* very much like it but smaller in all respects which has the bracteate flower-head & the trifoliate stigmas - & not yet ripe enough to show the circumscissile nature of the calyx-tube. I met here a sort of a *Diodia* which I well remember collecting before in considerable quantity which Grisebach has certainly passed over without notice as he has several others. The peculiarity of this plant is in the fruit which is blackish at least before maturity and has a sort of thin sarcocarp at length becoming dry. He has not noted in the description of *Borreria radicans* the generally trifid corolla. There is a little *Composita* with flower-heads like *Elephantopus* but the achenes ^{no!} with a pappus especially like that of *Roldana* have had thus & given us the name but I can't find out what it is. I have found a few specimens of an *Origanum* with a single white capitulum on a long slender scape. It will be more plenty by & by I think. I have a *Diodia* which on drying emits a strong pleasant odor of liquorice. I have a bran new *Arenaria* with little bits of leaves deeply dentate reminding me of the caulin leaves of some *saxifragas*. Of grasses & *Lycopaceæ* I go on finding at least if not new species such as I can't determine I found the other day what ought to be & perhaps is *Blechnum struthium* but it don't agree with the description and on the banks of a pine-woods ditch-like rivulet two sp. of *Frichmanea* & a *Ginseng* neither of which appears to be in Grisebach Oh! how I want the rest of the Catalogus. Day before yesterday I found what I suppose to be a *Micrantherium* and a new species fid. mem. It is much larger than any thing of the kind I remember to have seen. I have at last found a species of that curious aquatic cryptogam growing on the bottom of ponds & streams with grass-like leaves with sporangia of two kinds large

and small spores) and antheridium in the axils of the leaves. I can't
recall the name if it is not *Arolla* & I am very doubtful if it is.
This is larger than I expected to find such a plant judging from
figures. Some of the leaves are a foot long or nearly so. I find them
in exceedingly sterile pebbly soil, which, from this fact alone, ought
to be a new sp. of *Hypnidium* - the other or others growing on
rich soil in the mountains. As I have no descriptions to consult
for comparison, can say no more about it - It. white with a yellow
spot on the upper segments (I found a cat's nest here, with three
catkins which I killed, it being an "animal darwinis")

Yesterday I gathered what I suppose to be a *Mollugo*, but the
ovary cells are immovable - don't know what to make of it.
If I go on as the *Gloria Coloma* will be a big job - I got a
good ducking too or its equivalent. I walk to Coloma, a little
port on the coast some three leagues from here. It rained on me
a little when going, but it passed on me coming back. And yet, it
didn't seem to rain very hard, but it put the whole face of the
earth under water. One little stream, which was belly deep to my
knee, I had to swim swimming. Luckily I kept my portative dry.
Today it rained again great guns so that I couldn't go out of
sight of the houses. I spent a little time in collecting, with some suc-
cess though by with its leaves as well as some species of *Utricularia*
with the same object - an object which I haven't always kept
in mind as I should have done.

11th Today I slipped west, a little way, between the showers and found
the extreme of *Paspalum* - one not an inch high & not more than 3/4 inches
long the other six feet & more. I found a *Sceloporus* allied to *S. plantareus*?
and a *Rhynchospora* new to me but many of these have such a uni-
form family look that it is risky to say of any one that it is new.
I have a new *Bricea* with some culmules thus feet long & leaves a foot
long or nearly so. I find again in considerably abundance though rather poor
Abildgaardia setacea L. Dear Mr. C. S. Gray what I suppose to be *Leptosperma* Hispaniæ
with leaves as long as the culms a foot and more
17th The rains have ceased and the relatives have set in every thing
indicates the beginning of the dry season. I shall soon be able to camp out
if it should suit me to do so. I have been paddling about these last
days in various lagunas & day before yesterday I was among *Rhyn-
chospora surinamensis* (I suppose) and cut up my feet & hand rather
uncomfortably. It is a horrid saw. But I got good things ready. I am

getting quite bewildered in the multitude of new *Rhynchospora* Scopii
graminea *Bricea* &c. I found a huge *Adonis* not yet in flower, &
saved a couple of plants entire by doubling. It must be six or eight
feet high - grows on tumbadoras - those fruitful fields & so many
queer things. But I have the smallest *Phytolacca* that has you ever
seen & I dare say the smallest you ever will see. Large specimens
sometimes overtop an inch a little way but many very much
fall short of it. I have a new *Hymenophyllum* also - quite distinct from
any thing I remember. I collected again *Cochlearia* distichophylla
two or three years ago. I got some specimens of a *Capparis* very beauty-
& bad - a flower or two & some fruits with few leaves - a blonde. near Co-
pronumbers ^{Experiments} *Jag*. This I have seen often near the Co. lately I met
with one which I supposed to be this last, but the stem. an almost half
as long as the petals which are yellow & not purple as you say.
Hence suspecting it may be something interesting & not new I have
died an abundance of it. The margin of the above-named laguna
gave me an *Ipomoea* which I do not happen to have met with. It
resembles in the leaves & calyx. *I. pes-caprae* ^{Scopii} *Natal* but the cor. is
purple & smaller. Tomorrow I go to Pinar del Rio & there probably
to the *Yucania Esperanza* - a sugar estate distant about half a league
from the city. Near is in the laguna when I found a *Begonia* on a
tumbadora - a queer place so different from the general habitat
of those plants; and a *Polygonum* seen nowhere else. Got 'em again
17th ^{23d} Returned to P. & found no letters. Dear Mr. C. S. Gray
book the botanical come? I am despairing about it. Your friend has
not yet come & I am out of money still & I don't know what
Locurralle has done with all my paper. I am nearly out. I am
getting along as much beatened now with *Anisognathus* as I
was about there with *Rhynchosporas*. I have a huge one - found
on *tumbadoras* 6-8 ft high or more & poor or thin / fine wood
species lately found. Griesbach gives me but little aid in determining
these things. Collected again *Marcia Wrightii* & with flowers

The enclosed note to Griesbach I trust to your kindness to forward "this
side up with care" when you have occasion to write. It contains several
of my late little discoveries. I send them principally to convince him that
I am not so seriously dissatisfied with his catalogues as judging from
the tenor of his letter he may think I am & I want him to give me
his opinion on two or three of them.

My health has been improving till I feel almost well. The piles still
annoy me but not near so badly as when I wrote you of my serious

thoughts of coming home for the winter. I have now quite given up
the idea. I was very reluctant to abandon the field now just in the
real harvest season. In the spring, I can better afford to leave as the
vegetation will be very much dried up.
