

which is our date and took me to Arroyo Ando Dec 26th /66  
new & short at ~~Arroyo~~ ~~and~~ ~~and~~ ~~and~~ ~~and~~  
Dear Dr. Gray will speak with a smile and say that it  
was I that last named a few days ago in Perian del  
Rio closed over the word my departure in chase of Marathrum  
and Lesciadum. I have been successful in finding both - the  
latter in abundance and in flower. I confess that I suspect  
that Grisebach had mixed up things but I see that he was right  
Marathrum I found today but it has no sign of flower.

Besides these I have two sp. of Hypericum distinct I think  
from those named in the our Pl. 6ab. I have an abundance of the  
little Orlis considered by Grisebach as var. pygmaea of C. corniculata  
I shall be hard to convince that it is rightly named. I have  
a brn new Blechnum with very few, <sup>lateral</sup> pinnae and a long  
terminal one. A day or two before I left with I collected  
an abundance of Hypericum armeniacum Rech. as I suppose  
I have discovered here also a new Lunaria <sup>or leaves in flower</sup> ~~and~~  
I got an abundance of seeds with this design. Morsen Hepat.  
as usual. Some grasses which I can't make out and  
which ought to be in the Cat. Two sp. of Hemianthus a brn  
new Brigeron, very small heads. Our Parietum is rather queer.  
Let us hope the plants have legitimate paricula fl. the  
other half have them trans. forming into those of Bragantia  
but on stems not pinn's. Arundo dulcis phragmitoides gr. a-  
bounds here. A few specimens of a new Blechnum & a sp.  
Spiranthes with leaves of Holly. Tomorrow I go to Luis Lazo  
Quane Jan 1st 1867 "A happy new year" to you & Mrs Gray  
I came here yesterday where all is jollification in the  
"Festas de la Pascua" - Christmas. Today I went to the

neighboring cliff where I got little but shells and a broken  
or two for the hermano. From ~~among~~ ~~the~~ ~~rocks~~ ~~I~~ ~~went~~  
to Luis Laro and staid a few days. And now I can sing  
another song about Marathrum. I got a plenty of flowers  
& heavy rain fell there & it is showery-catching weather—  
since. I propose to go a little farther west among the  
pines. I want particularly to find again *Pimilia bellidiflora* Gr. which I don't believe is a congener of the others.  
*Arenaria myrtillodes* is not rare in these parts & I have  
seen it in various others but very rarely in fl. or fr.

Los Remates Jan 6th. Today I got a great abundance of *Pimilia bellidiflora* Gr. fr. & a few fl. I can't but doubt about  
its generic identity with the other sp. of which I got also  
today *P. repens* Sch. as I guess

I wrote you some time ago of finding a Gleome near  
Pinar del Rio like *C. procumbens* Jacq. but which seemed to me  
to differ in some points & I suggested that it might be the  
same as a coquimbana which I once collected here in a few  
miserable specimens. Today I find the same thing in the  
same miserable state generally but one specimen will  
serve to resemble it. It is probably a *Gleomella*. petals 4  
denticulate. Stam. 7 the 3 upper with bottleshaped (apparently)  
imperfect anthers turn upward the 4 lower approximate  
straight—the anthers approximate around or near the stigma.

The plant which above I guess is *Pimilia repens* has  
one peculiarity worth recording. After flowering the long  
peduncle takes a twist downward to the ground where I  
imagine the seeds germinate and very likely the capitulum  
throws out radicles and thus it goes on forming new plants.  
I don't hardly like to believe that the peduncle so slender  
as it is becomes a part of the caudex tho' it looks a little  
like it. But that is a law of the growth in this plant

that the fruiting capitulum should reach the ground  
I can not doubt.

Yesterday fell a perfect deluge of rain and filled all  
the lagunas covering up such plains as had sprung  
ups around them. Hence the semiblandos which are  
floating will afford the only botanizing ground in  
the hours. Tomorrow I propose to go to La Goya and  
collect if in fl. a little more of my *Kalmia* & then  
we're my way back to Retiro.

Caribbit Today I found a bran new orchid—a *Schomburgkia*  
in its essential character but it wants the large bracts  
I can see no other difference. It is quite a showy plant but  
requires climbing to get to it. I hired a negro to cut two  
trees after I had climbed one and then got a pretty  
good supply. It is strange that I didn't find it  
when here before at the same season for it seems  
abundant just at this spot at least.

8th Yesterday I found again *Kalmia microphylla* & a  
new shrub, which I haven't fairly studied—the flowers  
are so scanty; also *Hemianthus verticillatus*, sp. n. ~~4-5-styl.~~  
leaves verticillate; also *Polygala procumbens*, erect  
as a green hair; also more of *Gleomella lagenandra*, sp. n.  
miserable specimens as at Los Remates. A plenty could be got  
in Aug. or Sept. I wrote you some time ago of an *Eriogonum*  
with a single capitulum on a slender scape  
from a bunch of obovate thickish brittle leaves at the  
base. I have now a plenty of it. I find a *Chloris* which  
I can't make out (in fact I can't make out any of 'em)  
I ought to have got it when here before—also *Polygala*  
and can only wonder that I didn't. I find also *Thlaspidia*  
*radicans* Gr. I find also a *Chatogastria* which I can't  
determine (and I may say the same of them as of *Chloris*)

Sos Portales de Quame 10th. Yesterday I left La Guipa and my kind host Don Jose Valdez. On my way here I crossed the most barren spot I have seen in Cuba - pure white sand among the pines yet it gives a variety of good things. There grows in wet places perfect thickets of *Hypericum styphelioides* like a showy plant. I crossed over a thicker (very low one though 6 inches high) of my *Kalanchoe crassifolia*. I found also one if not two new sp. of *Brevicaulon* or *Papallanthus* (I haven't examined them) and what appears to me to be a *Lechea*. I am impressed with the idea that I got it before. I found something like *Walteria* but with long slender quite prostrate branches in the sand. Today I spent in the house of Don Pedro Valdez brother of my friend at la Guipa who wouldn't allow me to pay for the fodder which had to be bought for my horses nor ~~for the washing~~ for the washing of my clothes. Here I find again *Stegno-*  
*sperma* fr. and what appears to me *Metastelma leptostachys*  
fr. and a little more *Nierembergia rotundatum* Wm

Retir Jan 21st Returned today & find you of set out with meum.  
Many thanks — and now I must tell you of an occurrence  
which gives me some uneasiness. ~~Wednesday~~ Thursday morning  
last (this is Monday) I was feeling as well as usual i.e. quite  
well and continued my journeys soon after sunrise  
I had not been long on the way when I felt a prickly sen-  
sation in various parts of my body with feverish heat but  
very feeble pulse. I took off my coat then my undershirt  
as the sun was getting well up & hot. A glaring light came  
over my eyes but deprived me of vision and a kind of vertigo  
obliged me to dismount. After which I tried again to mount  
but would have fallen if I had not got down immediately  
I was near a house & lay down by the side of the fence. The  
man passed me to whom I told ~~me~~ my situation. He brought  
me coffee & afterwards some herb tea. While sitting then I would  
have fallen on my face if he had not supported me (fainting)  
after a while I was better and was able to walk to the house  
where I staid the remainder of the day. The next day is not  
quite as well as before I continued my journey. What  
of such an attack should come on me when standing on one  
of the cliffs. I must quit this work. Yours ever Chas Wright
