My dear Doctor,

What you send is an interesting
but puzzling lichen which I have also
found in the White Mts. It has a habit
of being sterile and hence the difficulty
in naming it. It appears to be what is
given in Tuckermans Synopsis as
Stereocaulon pileatum Ach. On looking at
the specimens in his herbarium it is

claim that he had changed his mind
several times as to the species. Pilophorus
Zibula Tuck. has very much the same
habit and, in the absence of fruit, it may
possibly be that your plant and mine
is really a form of P. Zibula. If you ever
come across this later, or any one looking
like it, in fruit I should be glad to get a
quantity.

I was sorry to be out when you
came to the Museum but hope that
you will come again.
