V. pellus is always has Deanes glorbours above. But you can settle this matter as the plants mature. Phalens has green capsula + small black seeds. V. Havida brownish capales & speckled seeds. You ought to find my Y incognità + its var. Forbosei up then; but it is a sly masquerader, as its name implies, often anistaken for something else.
