It is very likely decades ago, so that, as the German botamist arould say, the plant is now to be considered a well established blend-species."

The northern cantescent violets, V. ademca V consper. sa V. canadensis + V. publicens. Perhaps you have Them, but understand them satisfactorily. I fear that our good friend Fo Schuyle Mesthers is appolled by the number of line-drawings of grant from him; but unless he is overwhelmed with other tooks or is suffering from ill health, he will be able to do the work. He should bear in mind that the reduction in size is to be made by the plate-maker & not by the artist except in a very few cases when I would ever figures from the Ellustrated Hora. Glad you are so well + comfortable in there strongons days, But you are several years my joursor. I trust Nin Brown is still with with kind regards to both of you Haithfully Yours, Ezra Brainero.
