Dear Mr. Drane.

Just a line to let you know  
that we arrived in good order & on time, also  
with the "colored party" to take charge of  
the culinary aspect!! Not a small sur-  
prise for us. We arrived at North Sta. of course  
by Auto. & there were to bind them efficient  
but doubtful "Julia" I cleaned about & so  
did Mrs. M. for quite a number of aux-  
iliary minutes. but C. found her O.K. We  
had left Mary & little Carolyne & Hattie  
in the Pullman; - Mary of course in a  
nervous tremor lest she should "go off"  
& we get lost!! I was relieved when  
we all got into the Auto at Plymouth  
en route for the cottage.

Immediately after unpacking I tackled  
the smashed kitchen window which  
the kind housebreaker left for me to mangle

myself by mending. Laid that yesterday  
& bought the big pane of glass in Ply. & 75-  
7 years ago it would have been 25. Then I  
used up about \$10 = worth of time doing the  
job! The housebreaker stole absolutely nothing!

Birds are many; among them Rose-br Lgebrak,  
Dove, Deptle Harbev, Indigo Bunt. & Phoebe,  
(who has her nest & 4 young ones hatched out  
since we came, within 5 ft of the Gloucester  
hammock! she doesn't seem to mind us. Most  
absolutely noiseless wings she has — as differ-  
ent from the Finch tribe!

Letters this am. come from Guerico. They  
are now in Milan. All well. en route  
just near arrival at latter town an Italian  
with an abetter attempted to pick Frauds  
pocket just as he reached up with both arms  
to get down shawl-strap braddles etc. in the  
coachpartments. T. yelled "Nothing doing" & smash-  
ed down on the head of one man a 30 lb.  
bag: he staggered & shot away! — got nothing!  
No use to call police — no time, & Italian language  
limited. Well, I might have had sense enough  
to shout out "Gendarme, presto!" & the rest  
of the little Italian I knew, but I doubt

it, as lie slower to act in an emergency  
than molasses in January. But no doubt  
F & G. will know more Italian than I do  
before they get home!

They left London at 10 a.m. reached Paris  
at about 6 p.m. passed right or by "sleeper"  
to Lake Geneva. Then thru the Simplon  
Pass! Rain that a.m. until they reached  
the Italian frontier, but cleared enough to  
see the Alps before the electric engine  
carried them thru the tunnel. I went thru  
the H. Gotthard Tunnel - a wonderful loop-

to Cemetery only 10 mins walk, & set out a day  
Jacquie Red geraniums - not yet in bloom. As  
usual the lot was a mass of crimson  
pink Phlox subulata & here & there is a  
plant of Cypripedium Acaule, Vaccinium is  
in full bloom. White Lilac, & Gaultheria.  
No "Hermit" music yet. They never sing up

here before the 10<sup>th</sup> (or whereabouts of June). I do not see how he going to get time enough to band birds this year! Impossibly. He more than others work to do each day for 2 weeks & more, & they have not yet plowed up my garden.

We shall miss Gwendolyn, Eddie & Frank greatly - first year G. hasn't been here since she was born.

Eddie sends her love - she is yet unpacking, & I am just out of my truck, with rolls of yellow-papered proofs to be looked over & corrected.

The weather is good - no rain, & road is very dusty - Autos pass constantly.

Saturday night was cold - mercury registered  $33^{\circ}$  <sup>(on my porch)</sup>, so it must have dropped below  $32^{\circ}$  in fields nearby.

Let me know where you read Sheldene. Did spare a few minutes to collect the T. blanda? or, what?? It is about the cottage in bloom now. With best regards to Miss Brown
