I have just enjoyed reading your pleasant letter of the 3rd. I did find that the fern coll. by me on the cliffs of Castle Lake near Shasta were *Aspidium* something, var. *Scopularum*; but believe all the plants growing in rocky soil on the summit of the mountain about the springs of the Sacramento were *A. molliculus*.

I do mean to go to the north side of the Sta. Catalina Mts, where I did not go last summer, and will keep my eyes open. Rain having come to S. Cal. you will, I think have more opens of the Parish.

There is much that is silly in the language of the impossible. I am sure I mind you, two heads are better than one. I hope they will serve as a warning to think and though ambitious might be, I mean, etc. yours faithfully
