My dear Mr. Deane:-

Your Willow specimen
is so fragmentary, and mixed, as
to be of almost no value. If
all the leaves are from the same
plant - which I doubt - we have
one of those intermediate forms
not uncommon in New England -
but the twigs of young leaves
seems more discolor while the
detached (older) leaf is more like
humilis. The fertile aments
accompanying, are either S.
serrcea or possibly S. pedotarsis.
(the two not clearly distinguishing
at this early stage of growth)
So far from the leaves "becoming"
glabrous". You will see by this
fragment returned that it is
the younger leaves which are
only thinly overspread with hairs
while the older leaf is quite

pubescent beneath - Your comes -
I read probably relies upon a
memorandum as the locality &c.
There is no safe way for the
novice but to use traps - I
could tell in this connection
a funny story - about a mistake
made by one usually so very
careful friend Prof S. F. Ward.

He sends me specimens mixed of
S. longifolia & *S. ovata* - mixed leaves
and mixed flowers - I call his
attention to the fact and he
replies that he did not see how
there could possibly be any mistake.
The bush grows by itself in a
locality, rarely mentioned and
he was quite sure that fls & fol
were from the same bush - I
returned to him specimens of each
species - the identity of which he
recognized - but still protested that
how the mixture came about was
more a mystery to him than it

was to me - I had forgotten all
about the matter when the next
spring I received a humorous
letter glorifying the accuracy of
the cloud botanist and express-
ing the abject humiliation of
the local observer. He had found
his one bush the emit of two
with two bushes intercalated, growing
in intricate confusion -

I send you yesterday a
little box containing leaves of
Thlaspi - I am told that if placed
in water and set in a cool
place they will keep fresh for
many days - I hope they
may reach you in good condi-
tion - But here my misgivings
about - thus -
