a month at Wood Point, where we  
were guests of my father's former  
assistant Col. Hove, an ex-Congress,  
He has a large house, practically  
a hotel, though the family expense  
that term, at Cleveland Falls, two  
miles below the Post, is a callal  
"the Rocks" and is situated by But-  
tannish Falls, a raging mountain ca-  
valle the music of which, & nights,  
will call us to peaceful slumber, it  
most romantic and beautiful spot.

Of course we spent all the time  
we could at the Point proper, where  
Peggy had the run of the Corps of  
Cadets, with full dance-classes, walks,  
concerts - and pic-nics. She had  
"a perfectly lovely time; the time of her  
life". She met the very best men of

the Cape and they are surely a  
fine, many lot of fellows,

I look in almost as much  
as Margaret herself, always ac-  
companying her to the hove, except  
one night when I declivied in the
