I received your Steiner letter (1) - with its accompanying letter - in Vienna - If you mailed the first - on the date of its entry - it should have reached me at Steiner in my which did not leave there until the 28<sup>th</sup> - Glad to hear from you - very -

We have been doing some travelling more than we would choose ordinarily - but for the present - The duties of the Commission take precedence in large measure - in controlling our itinerary - I have not in mind at the

moment - where I wrote you  
last - From Budapest we went  
to Vienna - thence to Munich.  
There I left the crowd - and Mrs.  
Ware for a side step into the Austrian  
Tyrol - by way of Innsbruck - which  
I have just spent three nights -  
Came here this a.m. & go on by  
diligence to Cortina tomorrow  
morning. The last four days have  
been spent when the great masses  
of mountain rice immediately  
from where one stands - towering  
thousands of feet - The ride from  
Innsbruck here is through narrow  
winding valleys - and the mountains  
every where have snow upon them  
in one case I noticed - reaching  
below the level of our track -  
Approaching this village today - I had  
my first glimpse of the Dolomites  
which I recognized from pictures  
and descriptions -

I do not know what may

occur will be from Cortina & am  
going - from here to Bulzen - its  
"across country" - no railroad  
Auto - or dray - I chose not  
the first.

- Its thi spring of the year - and  
the country can never be more  
beautiful than it is now - grass not  
yet cut - and flower in great  
abundance - in masses of color  
yellow - blue &c. pink and white  
You would go wild with delight  
with the beauty of colors - and I  
cannot help wishing that you were  
indulging me in your companion  
ship at this moment - I do not  
like to travel alone - I greatly  
repet that Mrs. Ware's obligation  
does not permit other being here  
with me. I shall get back to  
her by the 12<sup>th</sup> I think.  
I am interested in what you  
write of the Club - & of Judge Churchill

I think I gave him my address  
but am not sure - I have not his  
I wish I had - I may send a letter to  
you to mail to him - Wish I might  
run across him. Kindly give my  
cordial messages to the good men  
whom I know as you see them about  
you - Rand - Dr. Robinson - Willing  
Fenwall etc.

I am not attempting to collect  
anything except fees - I am prepared  
to take these at any point

It is not wholly easy to do much  
letter writing - and I am not doing  
much - but I want to write you -  
I think many times of you - and  
I have a few' bridges for you -  
My very cordial greetings to Mr.
