

Lansing, Mich., Jan. 21, 1883-

My Dear Deane - We arrived here at noon. Snow plenty and weather cold. Mr. Smith and man were found Jan. 9th and were buried there, their bodies not being in condition to bring home. 3 of the horses were found alive although the harnesses were nearly eaten off by wolves. A fuller account from the brother, Jay, says that he did not freeze his feet in first finding a ranch, but after finding it he started alone in search of the party. He wandered about for a day or two, being lost and dug a hole in a snow drift and laid in it all night, freezing his feet and ears and face. He is coming out alright.
