Nares in roftri bafi. Lingua carnofa, obtufa, integra. Pedes fcanforii.

Pfittacus macrourus varius, capite gula pectore criffoque coccineis, dorfo nigro flavo-viridi undulato, alis caudaque cœruleis.

Rostrum pallidum. Pedes nigricantes. Rectrices duæ intermediæ virides.

### GENERIC CHARACTER.

Bill hooked. Upper mandible moveable.
Nostrils roundifh, placed in the bafe of the bill.
Tongue fleshy, broad, blunt at the end.
Legs fhort. Toes formed for climbing, viz. two forward and two backward.

### SPECIFIC CHARACTER, &C.

Long-tailed variegated Parrot, with head, throat, breaft and vent crimfon; back black undulated with yellowgreen, blue wings and tail.

The two middle tail-feathers are green. -NONPAREIL PARROT.—Naturalist's Miscellany. Pl. 93.

THE vaft Ifland or rather Continent of Auftralia, Auftralafia, or New Holland, which has fo lately attracted the particular attention of European navigators and naturalifts, feems to abound in fcenes of peculiar wildnefs and fterility; while the wretched natives of many of those dreary districts feem less elevated above the inferior animals than in any other part of the known world; Caffraria itself not excepted; as well as less endued dued with the power of promoting a comfortable exiftence by an approach towards ufeful arts and induftry.

It is in thefe favage regions however that Nature feems to have poured forth many of her moft highly ornamented products with unufual liberality : where, in particular, fhe appears to have flationed birds, fuperior perhaps in elegance to thofe of moft other climes; and which difplay their richly-varied plumage in fcenes unknown to mankind in a civilifed flate, and where their beauties can only be contemplated by the eyes of barbarians.

Amidft the number of thefe admired animals, the fpecies reprefented on the annexed plate may juftly claim a diftinguifhed place. It may indeed be doubted whether any bird can exhibit a plumage more elegant, or colours of a nobler hue. Thefe are fo accurately expressed on the plate, as well as mentioned in the specific character, that it becomes unneceffary to particularife them here. It therefore remains only to add, that the fize of this species is equal to that of the Pennantian, or Splendid Parrot, to which it is also nearly allied in specific and general disposition of colours.
