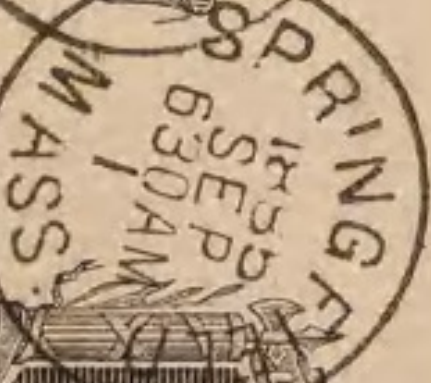

*E. poaeoides* - the type? If  
you can't spare the time just  
throw the plant aside, and  
wait till you do have time.

I came back from N.Y. this even-  
ing. I saw in a marsh near New Haven  
a beautiful clump of Marsh Mallois  
*Althaea officinalis* - I but very sure
