

Columbus Ohio April 26th 1860

Dr John Torrey

My Dear Sir — owing to my absence from home yours of the 5th inst has only just come to hand. —

I am glad to hear that Chemistry is in its turn laid aside, & that you and Dr Gray are now moving on with ^{the} Flora, a little slowly to be impatient 'tis true, but the waiting is well repaid when it does come. — much time and labour will be required to carry it out as it has been begun, but to let us have it in its original design. — do not forget to mail me a copy of P. II. as soon as it is printed. —

You name in your letter several books for my selection, I must request you & Dr Gray to act for me in that matter, any thing you or he does will be perfectly satisfactory to me. — There are ^{however} two works particularly, I wish to have Hooker's Day's Muscologia last Edition (and is not a copy with colored plates preferable?) — the other is Hooker's Musci exoticæ 2 vols, I saw it the other day at Louisville & like it much. —

In the list of my books I sent you a year
since, Park was not included, I mentioned I had
sent for it but was not certain I could get it, it
however came. — Perhaps the copy Dr Gray has ordered
for me can be had in N.York if not, let it
be sent on & I have no doubt it will sell here.

The microscope & what things are ready probably
had better be securely boxed & put in the hands
of the Baldwins No. 55 William St, to be sent on
with first goods for this place, as there will
be but few coming in this season. — It
is quite important to have every thing well
packed as boxes &c via canal & lake are subject
to the roughest kind of handling particularly
if they are marked "fragile" with care

Dr Gray has promised to give me some
instructions about operating with the microscope — tell
him I expect them & that he can not be
too particular in details, many things that
no doubt are quite common place with experim-
enced observers would be valuable to me. —

I am now preparing several parcels of plants
including some *Cryptogramma* for the European
botanist mentioned by you & Dr Gray — I shall
send them to the Baldwins & must request
of you or Dr Gray to see that they are
so marked that they will reach their

destination. — It is my intention to visit
this season many promising localities for plants
within our state. — The fruit of the *Taxi*
fragaceum plant will be ready for collecting
between 15 & 20th of June — but I hope the
specimens of immature fruit I sent you
in my letter will suffice you to determine
the genus — my respects to Dr Gray —
