The very acceptable joint letter

— I was much pleased to find that some
of my plants were new. — There was one thing
more however, that I wished to have your opinion
about — that was my conjecture as to the identity of
your two Thaspium cordatum & aruncum. When
time & convenience permit let me have the opinions
of you & Dr. T. on this subject. — Turning my
Bident into a crepis, I must confess took me
rather by surprise & I hardly know now but

not what it would be better to so alter the
genus as to let it be a Nidus still. — It has
so much the habit of the Nidus & looks like
the pupae of the corixopodids, as far as my specimens
go, appears to be an irregular & imperfectly developed
organ. — However in these matters, I am in deep water
— It surprised me much, that my acropis
turned out to be the "a. perpervicens" so little do
the descriptions in the books apply to it.

There is a draft for \$60 — intended to cover the
expenses of Heding & Sprague — which you will
please order for me — It was inconvenient to get

a draft on New York — this I hope can
be put into your hands by a decent interval
I suppose by this time Endlicher's Iconographical
& Bridal Flora have come to hand; I wish I could
get them & Hooker's & Taylor's Monograph this winter
I shall try & find some private conveyance.
Don't forget to send me the parts of the Flora
as soon as published — & let me know of any
that new, strange or interesting, in the botanic
 — all that I ever hear is through you way —
& Dr Long. — I have your sets of our plants
packed up for you & Dr T. but they are so
valley I am afraid I shall not be able to
get them on your navigation open in the
spring — I shall be on the lookout in your
next letter for a seed of the *Corniothrix californica*
— remember me to Dr T. —
