Columbus Decr 15th 1841

Dear Gray - your of 20th ult. came to hand & 5 or 6 days since in the last boat for this season came the interesting Carolina plants - I did not intend writing to you until I had more carefullly looked over them - But having just learned an opportunity of getting out a package from N. York I hasten to inform you of it - If possible I must have this winter Hedwig & Schwaegrichen, which you inform me has been forwarded to you by Schlechtendal who for doing this handsome thing I consider "a scholar & a gentleman"! - Alfred Kelley Esq of this place one of the Fund Commissioners of Ohio who is now in your city trying to raise the mind to pay interest on our state loans, will leave about the 1st of Jan^y next or perhaps a little later - I have by this mail written requesting him to bring out a box that you would give him - Call on him (see his direction below) & learn when he leaves, and whether he can take charge of it (of which I have no doubt) - Put in it any thing you have for me - if you have time have the books bound - don't miss this opportunity, I probably will not have an other before the boats run in the spring - mark on the box plainly in one or more places his name & residence for fear of accidents, which however are not to be apprehended - The receipts from you since my last letter are Necker's Methodus Musco, for which, my thanks, - a useful work as shewing the progress of the science - a number of Hooker's Jour. Bot. - 40 copies of my article & a copy of your admirable

Corolla paper or rather thick - it could not be better -
- The botany of that region is handsomely done up -
- But one thing was wanting to make the trip complete
that was - the re-discovery of the *Shorea galicifolia*
- Don't must look that up - provided it is there - Is there
not a little risk in establishing a genus upon "the only
specimen extant"? - mercurism, hybridity or deception
in some way or other might be suspected. -

- *Carex shortii* & *C. strobilifera* are not with
us concomitant in their habitats (p. 14 your list)
- your *Vaccinium Carstallaei* I found (July 1840 in fruit
only) on the Akron Summit near the Lake about
as high ground as we have - It then grows 5 to 7 feet
high - I then took it to be the *V. corymbosum* = *V.*
dismorphum, Mex. which you much resemble. -

The *Abutilon discandra* was one of the rare plants
I was glad to see - In an examination of a few of
the flowers of the "fertile form" I was sensible to satisfy myself
that the stamens were in "an abortive or rudimentary
state" - (I saw no traces of petals) - the stamens although
smaller anyway than in the other form had the
appearance to me of having been perfect. -

Your *Sabbatia paniculata* is certainly different
from specimens I have received as *S. paniculata* (from
which myself what I have as *S. corymbosa* differs
in little except the inflorescence) - Your *S. paniculata*
is distinguished from that in my herbarium by
its square, winged (not tooth) stem - linear oblong (not
ovate) leaves - corymbosa (not paniculata) inflorescence -
- calyx segments linear, bluntly acuminate (not tubulate)

- Spalulate (not lanceolate) petals - & Corolla tube
impenduliform (not urceolate) &c. - The lower
extremities of the lobes of the anthers (which are caducous)
are more produced than in any species examined by me
- perhaps it is the var. *angustifolia* under *S. corymbosa*
in Ellard - but if my specimens are to be relied on I should
doubt whether it belonged to either of the above species -
unless they vary greatly, of which I am not aware - how is it?

- The following is the best I can do for your misses &c. when
you get them named elsewhere, let me know how they
correspond. - 1. *Hypnum minutulum* - 2. *Welfia contorta*
- 3. *Platydictyon julaceum* - 4. *Diphyscium plenum* I found this
last summer 40 miles south of Ell. in gorges of *Rhodo. maximum*.
- 5. *Dicranum fulvum*? - (6. missings) - 7. perhaps one of the
numerous vars of *H. Coprosiphon*, the specimen contains an
obscure of the *Jungmannia juniperina* - 8. *Jungmannia*
Jamaicensis - 9. *Dicranum scoparium* - 10. *Hyp. Siliacicum*?
- 11. *Hyp. Coprosiphon* var. ?? - 12. *Hyp. brevirostre* - 13. *Hyp.*
adnatum - 14. *Archegonophorum heterostichum* - 15. *Archegon.*
pallidum - 16. *Gymnotonum curvirostrum* - 17. *Bozym erudum* - 18. *Jung.* (off. *remorosa*?)

- a neat collection several of them are not in Michigan -
But more might have been found - you are on splendid
ground for misses. - I want Hooker's monograph of
British *Jungmanniae* - if you can procure it send
it out in the box. - Among the specimens of
