To day I left at
the express office for you a
parcel containing specimens of
Eryngium Arkansanum pro. & fl.
Arabis petraea — *Hesperis pinnatifida*
Delphinium tricorne — *Cneorum
internatum* & *Uvaria trifolia* —

This is all you asked for — I shall
send you some more fruit of *Hesperis*
pinnatifida if it is not eaten up by
insects — that I send now may
drown — I doubt if it often

Matured here - the pod
is very succulent & is generally destroyed
by insects - out of about a dozen I
was waiting on I found all the
other day gone but two or three, one
of them I now send - the others
yet growing - hardly ripe enough
yet - but I think the *Corycodium*
ascendant - Sprague must
make it out. —

I send 2 drawings - the plants
Nat. size was made by Robt. Brown a
sort of genius - a jack of all trades
travels with occasionally penning -
people's faces - & collects a little for me
