

Columbus Sept 20th 1846

My dear Gray as written to to start your way

There is no need of apologies for my long silence, when I tell you that business calls here this summer occupied from 10 to 15 hours every day of my time —

The two boxes mentioned in my note the other day are on the way for you via Canale — One contains 700 & bundles of Phaeognathus plants my entire stock of duplicates, ^{mostly this coll.} including the Allegheny coll. from which last I took only a set for my Herk. — From the store I will write Mr Carey to supply his Herk. with what he may want — the remainder are yours they may be of use are to you in foreign exchanges —

In the box are 16 sets of M. A. — 7 for Taylor — Schuman — Gottschle — Lindenberg — Hamp — Schwaegele & Müller and 9 for you which with one or two more I think will make out your 15 —

I have from you 3 or 4 envelopes containing skins

interesting notes — The extract from Luzzomini's letter interests me much — Those Greenland & Labrador maps we must get hold of if possible — and any promises you may make as to returns in kind shall be fulfilled by me.

The package of Maps & Specimens from Montagne are safely in hand — a most valuable one — 160 of his new & rare species also 500 pamphlets — Gorst's parcel is pretty good — Thanks for the M. of Amer. Acad. — Delibes' Museum Book is valuable in acc't of the information about Voyages & collecting Botanica &c &c

The Gravera grows in open woods & in neglected pastures partly overgrown in dry places on rotten thin soil —

The paper selected for my plates is very handsome — impairs the engraving greatly — I send back Montagne's & Delibes' letters to you — And you for perusal also Nelson's Description Montagne & 8 others letters to me with notes on the same — as you are "perhaps Criminius" in putting forth the M. A. you know to read the pros & cons — They stand fine well so far — i.e. the Maps — I have heard nothing about the political — The Hookerian school would let them all stand pretty much as I have them — the German

would make a pretty considerable splitting —

Well what I have promised to you again & again is coming to pass — viz — that some Scarcos workmen will be out of the T. & G. flora make a five dollar cent operation, which I will allude to you — Mr. Chapman Wood made me a long call the other day, just on his return from Indiana where he had spent 5 weeks (4 of them on his task with the press) doing up all the Botany of the Western states with the view of adopting the 2nd Ed. of his book to Western robots — The 1st Ed. 3000 copies is all sold off — The 2nd Ed. is to be stereotyped this winter in Boston — pity you have not Monocotyledons ready for him — it would save him a deal of bother —

Now I'll give you my advice without chargin' you any thing for it — announce & have it appear in the course of the winter a manual or School flora containing plants found in the States only — suppose you can't get the 1st Ed. in as good shape as might be, then make up odds, fix it right in the 2nd — The main thing is to get possession of the track — and give it out that you intend to keep it — There is lots of money in the project — and why not pocket it — if you do not, others will & out of your own labours too — I have done little more this

Summer than arrange my Maps & Specimens
which was no small job — They are all now
in fine order for a good deal work I hope to put
on them this Winter — I have been compelled on
account of my burns to move into Columbus, this will
give me much more time for Bryology &
Here is *Genera illut.* getting on, send me proofs —

Have you good fruit of *Hesperis pinnatifida*? — I have
time very fine for you — I cannot at this moment say
my hands on it — it has got out of place in moving
in the other day —

Don't forget the Greenland & Labrador Maps —
I have heard nothing from Hooker — I suppose he is
very busy — will hear perhaps when he sends me
the promised *Antarctis* Maps —

I'd write you more specifically about
