Dear Gray

Several days since I sent you by Express two Boxes for Europe - at same time wrote you concerning them. I now send the Sierra del Tucson Maps & Spec.<sup>ts</sup> which I would like to see printed soon in the "Proceedings of the American Acad. of Arts & Sci."

There are all our Expeditions can claim. We collected many fine new Tucson things before the French & English, but they published them immediately on their return. — Leave directions to have the proofs sent me by mail before copies are finally struck off - unless this is done there will be blunders.

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Send me by all means Wright's Texan Maps & Apatite. — I have written him

punctually directed to San Antonio (as I trust) preparing to have to collect M & H for me.

I have ready for Hutchinson's P. III. a Letter from Wright's recd (by letter through you) from him. — I wish to see him kept collecting but would decline the management of his finances as you suggest (want of time) — I will however advance to the order of Engelmann or any agent you may select \$50 to keep him in the field. —

Paid by mail lately from you a Facsimile of Muller's Synopsis Muscorum which completes the *acrocarpus virium* — for hours before mentioned that Synopsis is an important Book for me. — continue to put me in early possession of it. —

Mosgraff offer to copy from Blight's Bot. for me is very kind but it will not do to tax her time & strength in such matters — buy the Vols if you can. —

Doddy & Molkenboer is published at Leyden-Bataviana (Leyden Holland?)

Buy beg & get (not quite steal!) all the Meissner & Hoppeianal you can lay hands on for me, from all parts of the world (except pure Europe proper for Schenkper keeps me well supplied with them — and except of course the U.S.) — I want particularly australasian Malaysian & polynesian species

= send \$100. for the odds & ends you may pick up for me in your tour Europe. — attend to the list of Books I sent you the other day — I need them badly —

I do not now recall any other works — but will look over catalogues — also will make out list of what I have so you can know what to buy — this list probably will not reach you until after your arrival in England. —

Now a parting word.— you are going  
on a very pleasant trip, and it will no doubt  
be to you a very pleasant trip, provided  
you manage matters judiciously— for instance  
you must not work so unmercifully hard—  
must not be in a perpetual fluster  
— take things moderately — it makes no sort  
of odds whether you write 47 or 49 books  
on Botany, a fourth part of that number will  
answer all scientific purposes.—

You will no doubt lay in a large  
stock of Botany, but above all things be  
counsel that Mrs Gray has every opportunity  
of laying in a large stock of good health.  
Our love and good wishes attend  
you both in your voyaging & in your  
journeying — write as occasionally as  
possible MSSallens

Now for the visit we have risked on  
you & Mrs Gray this summer.

As a matter of course it will never  
answer for you to be absent from the Amer.  
Association — there such a nice little trip for  
Mrs Gray — a fine opportunity for her to leave for  
a while the hot sands of Cambridge and  
enjoy the cool breezes of the lake and see  
the Falls of Niagara which I hope she has  
not yet seen. — When at Cleveland it is  
only 4 or 5 hours ride to Columbus by R. Road  
and I would never forgive if you did not both  
of you come down and spend a few days  
with us. — My wife and I are making  
certain calculations on the visit. —
