Sept 20 1852

My dear Gray

We are again safely
at home after an absence of 2 or 3 months
I have had a decidedly unpleasant
summer of it - have been somewhat
unwell pretty much all summer -
frightened - but courageous - cholera poison
etc etc. — But (D. G.) I am now
quite well and hearty and feel like
having a lively time this winter with
the Sandwich Islanders. Gegeaus New-Sea-
landers etc

I have been looking over your three
last letters, part of them received before

I left when too unwell to note correctly
particularly shall now advert to
principal items.

Fruit of Black ash & Blue ash
(Frax. qued.) and Smooth buckeye.
I shall send you without peels, waiting
for Lerquercay who is expected here every
day and will go where the smooth buckeye
grows 20 or 30 miles from this.

Here together with Müller one 2
copies of Mme. Atayban I will get off
in a week or two. — One of the copies is to
replace the one you sent to Molkenbauer
(which was exactly right) — the other to keep
on hand for a similar purpose i.e., when
something in the same way can be had
in return. — I have four good sets of

the Joe Hooker Antarctic maps and others
and shall do so in similar cases.

The first work I do will be to name
Send you for Col. Graham a set of
Wright's 2° surv. of N. Mex. coll 1851 as you
request.

Ask Mr. James of Phil. for specimens
of the White Ash & Penn & maps not
noticed in the Manual. — I have all
along been making notes on the M. & H. for
an other Ed. of the Manual.

You last letter contains 3 or 4 species
said by Mr. Mayr not to be in the Manual
I have not yet examined them.

Did I tell you I got last fall one
of Packet's latest & best microscopes through
one of our medical men who visited Paris
— it is a capital affair — powers my high &

detest, cost me \$150. —

I am glad to learn that the Bellum Wilkesianum is at last ended and favourably to our side. —

Cultivate your Dutchmen, and let us get from them those fine Mayarian maps. —

I fully intended to have dropped in on you this summer but was too much out of sorts. —
