My dear Gray

Today I start by Express

Box containing

1st. Muller excepting the last
specimens which I have not recd.

2 - 2 copies of Musc. Albyken - one as
I said to replace the set you sent
in my name to Dr. Mulkerin
the other to be used where returns
in kind can be had.

3. Fruity the smooth Buckeye & some
crab apples

4. Specimens of Fraxinus -

I send what is universally known
as the White ash (*Frax. americ.*) - But
why does the fruit differ so much
from Michaux's fig - has he given
fruit like his figure? or is his figure
incorrect? - enlighten me on that point.

The truth is I don't consider any
of his figures good though much
lauded.

You did not ask for *F. pubescens* but
you can get clear ^{the leaves} of the better than
I can - The variety (if it is one) I
see no mention of in the Books -
I found only one tree its bark wood &c
there nothing differing from *F. pubescens*.

The blue ash specimens are pure

a small tree 5 or 6 in. diam. It was difficult
to find fruit - 25th Sept being much too
late for it.

I saw no fruit on any of the
ashes (*Savigny* *F. sambucina*) except on
small & young trees from 4 to 8 in. diam -

Frax. juglandifolia Lam. I have not
met with ^{through} the range given in
the Manual we would expect to find it
here - still it may be here - I never
looked after the ashes until this fall.

I forgot whether Lea placed it at Cincinnati
or not - can't lay my hand on his catalog.

With the ashes I presume you
will have no trouble - But the oaks
I would not be surprised if you would

find a little knoty — at least I
always find Muscaya unsatisfactory
and I knew of no one else that has
looked into them much — copies & specimens
and contrast notes by some collector will
carry you through — But if you could
give ^{our} books in the West a little autopsy
you would be better satisfied — If you don't
get through before, come to Clarendon middle
of next September and we will take a tramp
— good point this from whence to look
after the books — here we ^{have} those that affect
the rich river bottoms mostly — 30 miles
South East in a sandstone region comes in
another set — 15 or 20 miles west on the
"Barreus" we have still another set —

I am looking for Wright to return this
