The lettering of title page same as you have it in note to Manual — on larger paper than in Musci Alleghan, i.e. $17\frac{1}{4}$ by $11\frac{1}{4}$ inches

The specimens are gummed on white cards with labels as in Musci Alleghan, and placed (4 to 8 according to size) loose in a sheet of rather firm drab-colored paper — all (of each set) in one bundle 4 to 6 inches thick — a thick paper board at bottom & top & confined by two string

tapes — we want 150 sets of the labels, title page & Index all in the style of Musci Alleghan. —

besides 150 little pages on a thinner, and colored paper (say drab, greenish, brownish &c) to paste on the top board. —

also 75 sets of the labels thrown into paragraph at form without resetting the type, in paper covers. — now have this put straight through. — send me by mail always duplicate proofs. —

I want your opinion &c on an other matter — I wish Schraeder to learn to draw in

I have done too much work
