

Tuesday Evg. Augt. 23d 1848

Dear Doctor -

This is a busy day with you - but the bustle of
conference will be over by the time my letter arrives.
At yet I am uncertain whether Mrs. Torrey will go to
Cambridge. She is now at West Point, with Herbert &
will remain, I presume, till Monday. If she goes to
Boston it must be soon after that.

You are doing hard, I presume, at those *Fendlerias* &
longistylis. Do you wish to examine my own set of Monte-
voy plants? It contains many of which there are no duplicates
for those army officers were obliged, in many cases, to snatch
specimens while stragglers of the enemy were watching a chance
to seize them! Is *Euglemaria* to do *Geggi* plants? I suppose
there need be no delicacy felt by either of us, if we think fine
new plants among them, about the right of making them publick
They will hardly come in my way - but they may come ⁱⁿ yours -
Halsted has some more Mexican Specimens for me. He had
about 2000, collected around Vera Cruz, when he left, when he
waited for the mountains, in charge of the quartermaster -
but on his return what place, nothing could be heard of them!

Edward (did I tell you?) has been ordered to California from Newbury - of course on the march. He promises to collect plants wherever he has a chance. Fremont's projects seem to be knocked in the head for the present. I have not heard from him yet about those drawings - but shall write again this evening. I hoped to have sent him a proof of the *Hemionia*, by this time.

As to the description - I have been so full of business that I could not stop very readily to draw it up. Besides, ~~I would~~ might it not lead Sprague astray if I were to make some mistake about the minute anatomy? He would, perhaps, think that he ~~saw~~ what I saw - & yet he is generally too acute to be deceived in that way.

To-day I sent money for the two species *Musci* to Hartig to forward to you in New York bills. MacLean & Field have not paid me - but I will get it out of them.

The testimonial for Holton (J. F.) can be directed to Robert Kelly Esq. Pres't of the Board of Education of the City & County of New York. May send it forthwith - or it may be too late. It is said that Prof Horace Webster, who has just resigned in Geneva College, (who succeeded Mr. Wat) will be placed at the head of the Free Academy.

You did not tell me how many of that old set of *Hemionia* drawings were to be finished by Sprague. I trust he has the original specimens from which several of them were taken. I don't find in my books the new *Bryum* which he drew two years ago.

I have received no letter from Casy lately. Is he in New York? I wish he would come here & spend a few weeks with me. We could dig into some tough genera, & throw one another into by working of odd things together - as you & he even won't do! I am almost afraid to enquire about Paul's legs - fearing that he is beginning to run down. He will go fast when the disease takes fair hold of him.

Every day, I am engaged in studying Pickering's plants, from the miserable bits that he has preserved. Some cannot be determined with any certainty - others must be thrown aside from the imperfections of the specimens. I am sometimes, however, led by turning to the Korthschoek set of *Spädigia* or the other series of Fremont.

Shall I shall have the remainder of Fremont's *Sapindaria* for you - which I mean to send with a parcel for Tuckerman - containing Lichens, *Peltigeras* &c.

I am just making arrangements for getting a supply of herbarium paper - & hope to have all my plants glued down by Mrs Torrey & the girls before Spring. Give my love to Anne, & believe me your most affectionately John Torrey
