Some of the 7th was lying on my  
table when I arrived this morning. I have  
transcribed the top for Beckwith, along  
with the prof. to Washington. as  
we agreed to have no Latin descriptions  
in Beckwith's Pope. I transcribed the  
desc. of Pent. heterandrum <sup>you now</sup> old me

I send you blank for Beckwith's  
drawings. Keeble's drawings will  
I write to you. No contract has  
yet been made for the engravings  
- but Keeble will probably get it.  
In that case you can send the  
drawings directly to him -

I enclose a letter from Meiss, ready  
to let Sprague see something complimentary

writes to me from Manchester Ohs.

plants, & wishes to study them. Enclosed  
a list of books that he will need.

He promised to send me what I have  
been anxious to get for years, viz. fruit  
of the two species of *Megarhizus*. All  
that I have has been so altered by pressure  
that it is difficult to determine  
the true structure. I hope to  
induce Dr. Andrews to send on all  
his plants. No doubt they will  
aid us in completing our descriptions  
of many imperfectly known species  
<sup>calif.</sup>
