My Dear Dr. Robinson

The last year's plants collected by me have all been sold to the Department of Agriculture you will no doubt be remembered in their distribution. I am now preparing for another which it seem to me ought to be the last trip for the work is more than I ought to undertake. Are you making a seed collection Mexico is a great country for Beans - Peas, Corn, Red Peppers, Ichia, Palm

Seeds. Seeds of medical Plants and of some vegetables not known in the United States - as for plants used for medicine and tied up in small bundles every market has its local medical flora tied up for sale, then there is the barks and roots for all sorts of uses. If I can aid your herbarium in any way let me know. I am trying to get off at the last week of this month.
