

Louisville, Ky. August 28<sup>th</sup>. 1847.

My dear Sir —

Early last spring I sent to you a small parcel of Mexican plants addressed to the care of Worley & Putnam and I have just now forwarded a very large bundle, collected in various parts of that country from Santa Fé to Beaura-Visor, and from the coast westward as far as Chihuahua. — This collection was made by Dr. Josiah Gregg, whose book on "The Commerce of the Prairies," the result of a long residence in various parts of New Mexico and frequent journeys between the western outposts and Santa Fé — you have no doubt read. Although making no pretensions to a knowledge of Botany, yet as an amateur in all the natural sciences, he availed himself of the guard and escort of various detachments of the army on different marches through that country, to explore its productions; and the present parcel, which he has had the kindness to present to me, is in part the fruits of his ardour in the collection of plants — you will find I trust most of the specimens, characterized and well preserved. — Dr. C. has added a label to each, indicating the localities, height, time of flowering, comparative abundance or scarcity, provincial names, medical & economical uses, &c. so that I trust you will find it altogether a very interesting parcel of plants, from a comparatively unknown region. I will only further remark on this

head that similar parcels to this were presented during the  
present summer to Dr. Engelmann and the American Institute  
of New York, the latter of which you may perhaps have seen.  
I forward my share with great pleasure to you in the hope,  
and confident hope too, that you will find in it some addi-  
tional material for the Flora of N. America, which, of course,  
it is the wish of all Botanists to be as complete & comprehensive  
as possible. Should you find anything new in the collection  
I need hardly express a hope that you will, in the name,  
commemorate the Discoverer whose labours in the cause, and  
at considerable peril, deserve to be remembered.

I observe in looking over the parcel that there  
are several duplicates of all the more interesting specimens,  
and I have the favour of you that, after examining  
them and retaining such as you may need for your own pur-  
poses, that you will return me the senders with their names.

The bundle is very securely put up and directed  
to "Dr. Torrey & Gray, care of Wiley & Putnam, New York."—  
I have forwarded it through Motlow & Griswold, Booksellers  
of this place, to their Correspondents in N. Y., so that I hope  
it will reach you safely & speedily.
