I must rely upon you for a copy of this,
as soon as it is published; for I have never
been able to obtain any of the publications
of the Smithsonian Inst. except a few of the
earlier volumes, which I found at Putnam's
some years ago; and the *Planter Wrightianus*
which you sent me.

My good friend -

As I had apprehended
and as I fear'd, my unfortunate letter to
you written on a half sheet of the unfor-
tunate paper, has occasioned you uneasi-
ness, and set you to work to remedy the
evil; as I learn by your letter of the 23^d,
and as I had inferred from your Telegraphic
dispatch of the same date. How will you
permit me to intrust you to give yourself
no further trouble about this matter,
but let it rest where it is. If Mess^r. B & H,
after seeing the fine I sent you by express,
are satisfied that I have not complained
without cause, and that the paper does
not come up to your order, I am satisfied.
Or if they prefer making some reparation
for the failure; and will send me at once
by Express one bundle (2 reams) of paper

twice as thick as this; almost as thick as the common Bristol board, I would be much obliged to them, and chearfully pay for the same. In arranging plants in my Herbarium I use whole sheets and half sheets - the latter requiring, as you know very well, to be thick and stiff enough to sustain themselves when held by one corner. Now for this purpose the paper on hand is altogether too thin and light, although it may answer (for want of better) for the whole sheet. As I use much more paper in whole sheets than in halves, I am quite certain that the amt. on hand, with 2 reams of the thicker sort, will carry me to the end of my botanical labours.

Before I quit this subject, it is but justice to Mess^rs Rice & Kembell to say that I have only opened one of their bundles, it being troublesome and inconvenient to have more than one bracketed at a time. It is therefore possible that I may find the others better than the first.

I have just received a letter from my Philadelphia Booksellers, Mess^rs Parry & McMillan, successor to Carey & Hart, saying that as they are about to close their business it will not be in their power any longer to supply me with *Curtis Bot. Mag.* which I have received regularly through their agency, and that of their predecessors, for thirty odd years, without the failure of one single number in all that length of time! - a striking commentary on the safety and reliability of Oceanic communications. My receipt of this work commenced with Sir William Hooker's management of it in 1827, and has continued down to the end of 1859. I have made repeated efforts to procure all the preceding volumes, but have only partially succeeded. Some years ago Carey & Hart procured for me the earlier volumes, from Vol 1. to Vol 32, inclusive; but the gap from 32 to 54 remains still unfilled. I hope you will be able to supply the deficiency through your Lon box
