

St Louis Jan 11th 1853

My dear Doctor

your letter written at Christmas
came to hand a few days ago - and a long and
full one it is, for which my thanks. And also
my thanks for your care of my wishes and desires
as regards Wright's plants. But as he has sent
to me formerly some packages of plants from Texas
(though most of them of not much value) I
propose to pay him \$100.00 and if you think
that money is at present an object with him for
his outfit etc, I am willing to furnish \$50. besides
for which he may return collections to be made
during the expedition. But I must beg you to
advance this money for about 4 weeks, when
I shall refund it; this is the season (after
new year) to make out accounts and bills and
collect fees - a most abominable business to me
but also a most necessary one, which however
has kept me from Cacti since 3 weeks, and will
do so for a week or two longer. After that all my
energies will be devoted to Cacti - Euphorbias
and Passiflora etc.

Your proposition in regard to Emory Graham
& Wright appears to me to be a fair compromise.
The paper however should be published separate
in the Soc. Contributions I think so as not to
offend either of the high contracting parties

but that may be left to future negotiation, as we are in no hurry about it; meanwhile I will publish with your pl. Wrightianae a short abstract, as you propose, of all new or corrected species.

For that purpose I wish you to return to me the manuscript after Elliott has looked through it and has made such notes and alterations as he may deem proper and necessary. I desire him particularly to examine the Introduction and revise it. — Has he seen Graham and conversed with him about the live Cacti, which he claims?

By the time that I receive the MSS back I will probably have finished the Cacti & Opuntiae and will be able to immediately return to you the whole abstract.

In the full account I can use then the material which I shall receive from Torrey and that which Bigelow, Parry & Schott are still accumulating on the Rio Grande and hope also to observe many species in bloom by that time.

Have you at Cambridge good figures of Cactaceae in the Library, which an artist may study, so as to see how such things are best done — for it is not even the most skilful artist, who can do justice to such specimens without studying them as you well know. I see the same in a full drawing sent me by Mr A Schott of this new *Anhalonium* — Singulär

enough it is almost impossible for me to make out what he means, though the drawing is a good one!! — If Emory will furnish plates, they ought to be creditable.

I am glad you got the parcel from Deers — What do you say about the new *Hypox* — is the form of the leaves not very different from all other species? I shall send specimens of wood of this species and of many others shortly for you, Lowell & England.

I hope Torrey sends by Express without any further delay — I have not heard from him yet.

I shall soon write to you again, whether I can find an opportunity to send off in your parcel or whether you have to send by Express.

Wait a little with Howard's plants yet — but if he does not sell, we will send them to Braum. I have had a long letter from him lately after long silence — he appears to be very busy and very much pleased in Berlin but it will be some time before he can get things in such a train, in the Garden, Museum etc, as he wants them.

Do you know this willow of Linckemann, which flowers in summer?

I shall be glad to see the Chaine and shall confer with Braum about them immediately.

I was pleased to find your name on the title page of Silliman's Journal — but is it not the same case with you as with Torrey that you have "too many irons in the

five"?

How is Walpers' Annals? apparently necessary to possess! I shall send for the work; but he should be made aware of his mistakes or oversights mentioned by you in Sull.'s journal.—

Would it be possible for you to give a list of Fendler's Chrysanthemum plants as enumerated by Schiman?

I shall soon write again, and expect soon to hear from Wright

What is the work on north American frost-trees to be published by you, mentioned by the annual report of the Smithsonian

N.B. I got Specimens of the eastern *Gymnosporia triotoma* & compared with that from Mr Porter which appear distinct but commona is different from our plant, which therefore appears to belong to *G. triotoma*, but mostly with more finely cut leaves, smoothness of scales of bud and of cup appears almost the principal difference!
